

Put Northwestern Highway Project Off Until After 1972

Extension of Northwestern Highway as a freeway across the northeastern corner of Farmington Township will be delayed until after 1972, it has been decided by the State Highway Commission.

The \$23.8 million project was part of \$265 million in proposed highway construction deleted in recent days from the state's current five-year road building program.

A warning that this would occur was issued in Pontiac two weeks ago by Deputy State Highway Director John P. Woodford, and confirmation of the action now has been announced by Acting Highway Director Henry E. Staats.

Both men agreed that, "The need is there, but the funds are not."

ORIGINALLY It had been planned to take bids for extending Northwestern in 1971.

The current divided highway enters Farmington Township at Inkster Rd. and continues for nearly two and a half miles until joining Orchard Lake Rd.

The Highway Department wants to extend the Northwestern freeway corridor a total of approximately 10 miles and let it join with the proposed M-275 freeway, which will run north and south as a parallel to Haggerty Rd.

CONSTRUCTION of M-275 also is a project which faces deferment until after 1972, Woodford said.

Michigan must more than double its current 1,300-mile freeway system by 1980 if it is to keep pace with highway needs, stated Woodford.

"We must build more than 100 miles of freeway every year between now and 1980, but we are going to fall far short of that goal unless additional funds are made available for construction," he continued.

In Oakland County itself, which now has nearly 50 miles of freeway open to traffic, an additional 50 miles are needed within the next decade, stated Woodford. It includes the Northwestern Highway project in that estimate.

School Board Plans Review Of Administrative Salaries

Routine business conducted by the Farmington Board of Education at its regular meeting Monday night included:

- Referral to the board finance committee a review of administrators' salaries and referral to the administration and the board lawyer the matter of tax sheltered annuities.
- The matter of annuities came to the board's attention through a teacher's letter requesting board approval of an annuity with a different insurance company than the board carries.
- Entrance into an agreement with architects Ralla, Hamill and Becker, Livonia, to proceed with preliminary work for the learning center at William Grace School with the stipulation that the school's center court be utilized in preliminary drawings.
- Approval of expenditures of \$2,500 for improvements in the athletic fields at the high schools; approval of equipment purchases of \$251.55 and \$1,002.24 for Forest and Power Junior High Schools.
- Granting of an easement at the Eagle School site to the Detroit Edison Co.
- Approval of construction of a fire-foot concrete walkway on a 10-foot easement from Castlereigh to Lyncastle at the request of Lincolnshire Subdivision Association. The walk will serve as an approach to East Junior High.
- The subdivision was directed to install and maintain the fence, which it had requested the board to do.
- Approval of election inspectors for the Nov. 27 special school election.

Two Youths Charged With Chain Beating

Two Farmington Township youths, 17 and 18, who are accused of brutally beating a juvenile with a chain have been formally charged with felonious assault, with the bond of each set at \$2,500 by Novi Justice of the Peace Emery Jacques.

Their examination has been set for 1 p.m. Nov. 3 before Farmington Township Justice Byron Walter.

Accused of administering the beating are Larry Miller, 17, of 23445 Sans Souci, and Curt Corey, 18, of 21672 Purdue.

The victim was a 16-year-old boy who, according to Township police, was picked up by the Miller-Corey duo on 13 Mile Rd. while the lad was hitchhiking to his part-time job late the afternoon of Oct. 26.

It is alleged that Miller and Corey beat the boy with chain, although police make no statement as to what provoked their action.

A spokesman at Providence Hospital in Southfield, where the boy was treated, said he had suffered lacerations of the head, plus multiple abrasions about the body. He underwent X-rays of both the head and knee areas to determine whether he had suffered other injuries.

Upon their justice court arraignment, both Miller and Corey stood mute and plea of not guilty were entered automatically.

The beaten youth has a part-time, after school job in the shopping center at 13 Mile and Orchard Lake Rds. The assault occurred after he had been picked up hitching a ride near the Colony Park subdivision at 13 Mile and Farmington Rd., only a mile from his job.

Wolves Posed Problem In 1830

Today there's hardly a wolf in Michigan. But in the Farmington of the 1830's, they were a problem.

The state offered a bounty of \$8 for every wolf killed, and Oakland County offered another \$5, according to Seeley's History of Oakland County. Farmington settlers took advantage of the bounties.

The county history says Arthur Power, the first settler, lost an ox but earned enough money trapping wolves one winter to pay for another.

His son, Nathan, one winter trapped seven wolves—six gray and one jet black, according to his grandson, also named Nathan Power.

The younger Nathan told the Oakland County Pioneer and Historical Society in 1933 his grandfather's experience with a particularly powerful wolf. The wolf "pulled up the stake to which the trap was attached and dragged trap, stake and all a long distance through the woods, only to get it caught between two trees, where he was found and made to pay the penalty for the raids on grandfather's stock."

BEACON OF FAITH

Among the most prominent new landmarks in Florida is a 20-story-high nickel stainless steel cross at the Mission of Nombre de Dios, St. Augustine. Known as a "Beacon of Faith," the monument marks the site where the cross of Christianity was first permanently planted in the United States more than 400 years ago.
