State Payment Hits \$712,210
The Farmington School District was paid \$712,210 this week as the second of six installments on its 1967-68 school-aid allotment from the State of Michigan.

During the course of the academic year the school system will receive a total of \$4,181,338 from the state, allocated at slightly more than \$270 per student for its official enrollment of 15,245.

This represents 49.8 per cent of the anticipated receipts for the district for the current fiscal year.

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'Elementary Grades Most Important'-Principal Says

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Death Takes Long-Time Goodfellow

Henry James Hubbard, of 22655 Brookdale, one of the 10 original Detroit Goodfellows, died Nov. 2, just three days before his 90th birthday.

Hubbard sold newspapers as a Goodfellow on a Detroit street corner for 45 years. He retired in 1957 from Hubbard and Hubbard, Detroit, a business he operated with his brothers.

He was a veteran of the Spanish-American War and a member of Metropolitan Methodist Church, Detroit. He had lived in Farmington for 15 years.

Services were held at 1 p.m., Saturday, Nov. 4, in the Heeneey-Sundquist Funeral Home, with burial following in Woodlawn Cemetery.

Hubbard is survived by his wife, Elizabeth L.

"I would hope that by the time a child leaves Wooddale that he's developed himself to his full capacity and that we, the teachers, have gotten the best out of him that he can do in regard to his abilities."

COWAN'S interest in child development may be the reason he took his master's degree in guidance and counseling.

He is a great believer in physical fitness and thinks Farmington's physical education is "one of the best around."

"If you're not physically fit," he notes, "you're not as able to handle daily chores."

He keeps fit with soft ball and basketball, but hasn't had much time for it lately with his new duties.

"But," he says, "the job compensates for this."

In talking to Cowan, one thing is apparent - this compensation he finds in his job as principal is the contact it brings him with children.

His voice grows warm when he discusses children and he states as a criterion for the good elementary teacher, "They're got to love children."
