Transport Permits Required

Pistol owners who have any plans of transporting their weapons any distance at all for use in hunting or target shooting will need a concealed weapons permit starting Thursday, Nov. 2, Township Police Chief Irving H. Yakes warned this week.

Yakes stated that an amendment to the state concealed weapons statute, effective Nov. 2, states, "No person shall purchase, carry or transport a pistol without first having obtained a license therefor."

The word "license" does not mean a license to buy a pistol, but rather a license to carry a concealed weapon, said Yakes. He is joined in this opinion by Oakland County Prosecutor S. Jerome Brown.

"This statute makes it necessary to reinstate hunting and target permits, and also to include in all new hunting and target permits the word 'transport,'" Yakes said.

It therefore has become necessary for those who already hold permits for pistols to apply for new permits if the weapons are going to be used for hunting or target purposes.

Seek Prevention Of Delinquency

A projected statistical analysis of the location and nature of delinquency and neglect behavior within Farmington, plus a unique experimental attempt at predicting individual delinquency in time to prevent anti-social behavior.

DIRECT CONTACT of the YGC with the pre-delinquent is provided, on a case-by-case basis, by Larry Carps, court-appointed social worker, who enlists the diagnostic aid of professional members of the committee.

Referrals are made by the schools, parents, police, doctors and members of the committee.

Acceptance of the YGC's and Carps' help is voluntary on the part of the parents of the delinquent.

Because development of a well-defined program to prevent delinquency is the committee's goal, it constantly searches for new approaches and proposals to help to accomplish this goal.

Like other agencies, the YGC has found there is no satisfactory answer in preventing delinquency.

WITHIN the framework of the YGC is a case work committee which assists Carps in the diagnosis, plans and disposition of various clients.

Further duties of this committee are to help in the evaluation of cases, to make recommendations relative to the future needs of the commu-

nity, assist in finding local resources and identify these so they can be used in the diagnosis and treatment of clients.

In 1964, this committee carried over 14 cases, 11 boys and 3 girls. New cases in 1965 numbered 28, 22 boys and six girls. Of these, eight cases were closed, with 34 cases (31 boys, three girls) carried over to 1966.

Another YGC sub-committee is the fact finding committee. The task of the committee is two-fold: To view the immediate situation on delinquency and to view the projected situation.

A COMMITTEE report breaks down into frequency of offenses by area of residence, frequency calendarized direction of aggression and comparison of frequency with number of offenders by age.

Offenses studied include those of theft, vandalism, maliciousness, sex, runaway and truancy, brutality and others.

From 1962 to 1965, the ratio of offenses ran—thief 96-110, vandalism 33-64, maliciousness 30-3, sex 3-14, runaway and truancy 40-47, brutality 9-20, others 55-132.

Frequency of offenses have been found to be highest in August, although offenses in September and April showed increases, with March showing a continuing upward trend.
