An Ecumenical Library Is Aim At St. Alexander's

Sister Colette, O.P., of St. Alexander's Family Education Center, Farmington, will be a member of the panel of speakers at the first interfaith library workshop to be held from 9 a.m. to noon Nov. 15 in the First Methodist Church, 320 W. Seventh St., Royal Oak.

The workshop is one of three interfaith and synagogue library workshops planned to present a special theme and meet a special need.

THE WORKSHOPS were set up by the Ecumenical Movement Library Committee formed by the Michigan Unit of the Catholic Library Association through its parish section joined with the Detroit Metropolitan Council of Churches and the Jewish Community Council of Metropolitan Detroit.

The aim of the committee is to support dialogue and understanding by means of library facilities.

During the plenary session, Sister Colette will give a composite view of St. Alexander's Family Education Center—a total educational effort stressing the impact of religious, cultural and social influences on the total parish community, including people of all ages.

OTHER SPEAKERS for the plenary session whose theme will be "The Thrust of the Church Library in the Educational Process," will be: Mrs. Juana Ziegler Oas, of the St. John Episcopal Church library and the public library of Sturgis, Mich.; and Albert Elazer, superintendent of the United Hebrew Schools of Greater Detroit.

Following the plenary session, Sister Colette and Mrs. Oas will conduct a workshop on "Methods for making a church library functional in the total program of the church."

Mrs. Ruth Smith, of the First Methodist Church and associates, will conduct a workshop on "What books and materials should be in a good church library."

A third library workshop, "How to relate the church library and community resources," will be led by Miss Carolyn Palmer, of the Royal Oak Library.
