--It's too late for surface mail, but for Space Available mailing, you have until Dec. 1 at five pounds weight limit, 60 inches in length and girth in size; and airmail from Dec. 1 to Dec. 11.

"Armed Forces Overseas" refers to personnel of the arm-ed forces, members of their families and U.S. civilians em-ployed overseas who receive mail through an APO or FPO in New York, San Francisco or Seattle.

Correct APOs or FPOs mus be on all this mail.


