Panel To Discuss Means Of Coping With Mental Illness

The most effective means of combating mental and emotional disturbances will be discussed by a panel of three at the 10 a.m. program Sunday, Jan. 14, in the Universalist-Unitarian Church of Farmington.

Members of the panel will be Dr. Sanford Bloomberg, psychiatrist and member of the Farmington Board of Education; Don Kern, psychologist and assistant director of the Detroit Wayne County Mental Health Board; and Robert Miles Eddy, minister of the church.

Eddy recently has conducted several "coping groups" in which small groups of individuals meet in discussions to try to help each other find solutions to problems.

HE SAID THE PANEL would go into a number of questions in the field of psychiatry and counseling, including:

- What special training for psychotherapists to psychiatrists, psychologists and ministers have?
- For what does this training qualify them?
- Has the so-called medical model been harmful to people's attempts to cope with mental and emotional disorders?
- What differences between "insight" and "existential" therapy, and what are the pros and cons of using each?
- Does the mental health of the therapist determine his effectiveness?
- How can the various helping professions best cooperate to improve the mental health of people in our communities?

EDDY SAID all persons interested in the subject are invited to attend the program. There will be an opportunity for written questions from the floor and open discussion of the topic after coffee.

Next weeks community open house plans include congregational communion at 10:15 a.m., with a guest sermon by the Rev. Harold Heide, executive secretary of the English district, a chancel drama by Concordia College choir at 2 p.m., a concert by the Concordia College choir at 4 p.m., and Dedication Vespers at 7 p.m., with the Rev. Richard Fouch, director of education for the English district, as guest speaker.

The congregation was organized on Pentecost Sunday, 1964 and has been worshipping in a small chapel on Ann Arbor Trail and renting classrooms in the Allen School on Higerty Road for Sunday School.

Invitations also have been extended to members of the Plymouth Ministerial Association and to St. Joe's Catholic Seminary, and the Holy Richard is invited to attend.

Participating in the service of dedication will be the Rev. John Baumgartner, of Milwaukee, first vice-president of the church's English district, the Rev. Martin Eggers, stewardship chairman of the district, and the Rev. Dale Krueger, of All-Saints Lutheran Church, Livonia.

Clergy To Join WSU City Problems Seminar

Clergymen of all faiths, lay leaders and persons involved in religious-related social service agencies will attend a one-day seminar "The City in Crisis and Perspective" being held Sunday, Jan. 14 through Friday, Jan. 19, at Wayne State University.

The seminar, sponsored by WSU's Office of Religious Affairs and the Center for Urban Studies, is the first in a series of continuing education seminars. They are designed for religious and lay leaders in the metropolitan Detroit area who are concerned with problems of urban society and the possibilities for religious involvement in its growth and renewal.

Abortion Law To Be WEC Topic

The proposed liberalization of Michigan's abortion law will be the program topic at Jan. 15 meeting of the Women's Economic Club.

Speaker for the session will be State Sen. John E. McCaulley, who introduced the measure. The Michigan Senate last March. The luncheon meeting will begin at noon in the Sheraton-Cadillac Hotel.

Sen. McCaulley, who holds a law degree from Wayne State University, has had a long career in public service, dating from 1925 when he began his first term as a member of the Wyandotte City Council.

Before being elected to the State Senate in 1964 he served as mayor of Wyandotte, a delegate to the Michigan Constitutional Convention, and a member of the governor's commission on county home rule.

He is presently a member of the Senate Committee on taxation and municipalities and serves as Democratic Caucus Leader.

The WEC will depart for its customary Tuesday schedule for January to hear Sen. McCaulley.

Albert Cleage, minister of the Central United Church of Christ, and the Rev. E. Douglas White, of the Detroit Industrial Mission.
