THE PETROLEUM industry was cited as an example of a government-sanctioned cartel that stifles competition with the blessing of Congress.

"Under the antitrust laws, it is a per se offense for private firms to fix prices or allocate markets, yet in the name of conservation the government does for the oil companies what they could not legally do for themselves," Adams charged,

He noted also the oil companies receive a more visible favor, the 27 1/2 per cent depletion allowance against gross income.

ADAMS SAID the govern-

oppetion allowance against gross income.

ADAMS SAID the government should not interfere in those markets which, in the absence of such interference, would be workably competitive. And the government should preserve and use effective yardsticks for measuring and controlling monopoly performance, he said, adding:

"The public must recognize that the servants of the military-industrial stale cannot be allowed to become its masters—either in the name of "tree enterprise" or under the guise of promoting the haltonal security."
