

Dog Licenses Now On Sale

Dog owners both in the city and Farmington Township have until Feb. 23 to buy their 1968 licenses without paying a penalty.

In both cases, the fee is \$1 for male or spayed dogs and \$2 for females. In addition, the owner must present a certificate showing that each dog has received a recent rabies inoculation.

Licenses within the city may be obtained from the Farmington police department around the clock, seven days a week. Township dog owners may pay the fees at the township treasurer's office during business hours, Monday through Friday.

Starting March 1, the city license will cost double, but to the township-- as in the rest of open county areas -- it will be boosted more than that, going to \$5 and \$7.50 for the two types of dogs.

Meanwhile, the Oakland County Animal Welfare Division has announced a series of month-long clinics for the inoculation and licensing procedure. Dogs may be vaccinated at any such clinic for a fee of \$2.

The two which are planned for that portion of Oakland County will be held Feb. 3 in Novi Township Hall and Feb. 24 in the Farmington Township fire hall at 21420 Wheeler.

Marklam, for North Farmington; Mrs. Henry Ouellette 2427 Westmeath, for southeast Farmington; and Mrs. Nina Keith, 41009 Malot, for Novi.

The price per package of cookies hasn't changed, it's still 50 cents with each troop receiving a bonus of five cents. Profits go toward providing more and better services for the troops and Scout camps. Orders will be taken for the 'cookies' until Feb. 4. Scouts will make deliveries between March 6 and 13.

Cadet and Senior Scout troops will also have public sales between March 22 and April 13.

City Planners Call 'Old City' Idea 'Premature'

Farmington city planners designated as "premature" the story on the "old city" proposal released to The Enterprise and Observer for last Sunday's paper by the Farmington Historical Society.

First formal report of the historical society's project was given to the planners at their meeting Monday night, the day after the story appeared.

Commissioner Russ Milligan, who with Commissioner Charlotte Bruce serves on the sub-committee set up to work with the society on historical sites, presented the report.

SOME OF THE planners described themselves as "alarmed" when it came to Point 5 of the report which states: Preserve Shawassee, Warner, Oakland and Thomas streets as representative of the "old central city."

Commissioner President Fred Seibert called this "in conflict with our master plan." It would thwart our desire to revitalize the north side of Grand River."

Agreeing with Milligan that there are some valuable, selected houses of historical value within this area, City Manager John Dinan noted, "We feel that some of those houses in there are beyond the state of restoration. They have no historical significance and are an eyesore."

Commissioner William L. Burke commented, "Preserving Shawassee is quite a stretch."

Commissioner Jim Platt came up with the thought of having the city building inspector take a look at designated buildings.

"We don't want to be obligated to preserving a building that may collapse in a few years. Preservation should depend on the historical worthiness and condition of the building," Platt said.

PIATT ALSO speculated about the possibility of providing some incentive for getting occupants to restore designated houses.

Commissioner John Allen voiced the commission's caution about wholesale "freezing" of the area. (So named by the planners) and said, "You can easily stifle a community's natural growth by going overboard."

Dinan added, "We do have significant locations but we don't want to give a carte blanche freezing to a whole section."

Milligan rather tempered things by summing up, "It's premature to make any speculation on any of these things. Within the next week or two, the sub-committee will be meeting with the historical society and then we will prepare a more meaningful report."

Dinan pointed out that Southfield has some 4,000 units in multiples, twice as many as Farmington city and township combined.


