Needless to say the Danish girl's American "mother" Mrs. Wesley Robertson, 2149 Chestnut Lane, is so happy to take all the plesher new daughter can eat.  
It took Birgit longer to learn to enjoy pizza. This was because one of her first pizzas was made with pepperoni.  
"It set my mouth on fire,"

she says. "I like better with ham and cheese."  
THE GIRL from Scandinavia and her Farmington sister, Carol Robertson, have established an unusual relationship, sharing interests from music to photography, to knitting, to bowling.  
With Carol's guidance, Birgit had joined the Rainbow Girls and is now an officer in that group and has also joined the Girls Athletic Association at Farmington High.  
While Birgit hopes to "be something with math or physics or something like that—I also want to be something with people and to travel."  
Carol hopes to become a professional organist after at-

tending college for two years. Carol has studied organ for five years while Birgit plays the flute, violin and piano.  
LIKE MOST exchange students, Birgit has found that American boys and girls band together in groups.  
Her thought on this is "They do it because of all the school clubs, American boys and girls because of this have to go together in groups."

"And they give compliments. When one complimented me at first I thought it was a big joke because I was so used to being complimented."

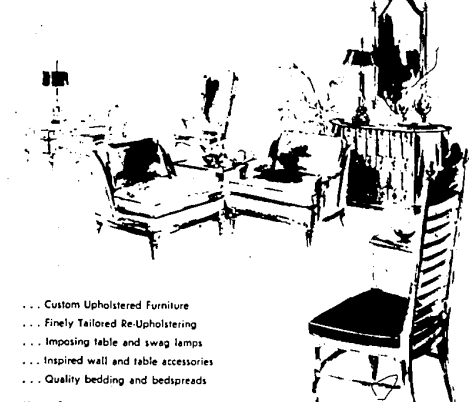
