

U-M To Emphasize Role Of Intramural Athletics

A new athletic structure giving greater independence to the physical education department and emphasizing intramural sports has been announced by University of Michigan President Robert W. Fleming.

Two associate directors will be named, one for intercollegiate athletics and one for physical education. Both will report to the director of physical education and athletics.

No one has yet been named to succeed director H.O. "Ernie" Crisler, who will retire June 30. "The structural solution was a necessary prerequisite to the search for a successor," Fleming said.

"THE NEW structure requires a re-evaluation of the qualifications of possible physical education and athletics directors, and that process will now take place," Fleming added.

"Though members of the present staff will certainly be considered for the newly created posts and the over-all directorship, it is understood that coaching, teaching, or other assignments for next year will not be affected. This is essential in view of the late de-

cision on the structural question."

The president noted that intercollegiate sports were not being downgraded by the additional independence for physical education and emphasis on intramurals. "The University has always been a great competitor in intercollegiate athletics, and it expects to remain so," he said.

THE RESTRUCTURING was decided upon after long discussions with faculty committees and the University Regents.

Fleming noted that neither the administration nor the university administration felt that this is the time to establish a separate school of physical education, as some faculty members suggested. But all agreed that the physical education program deserved greater independence.

An advisory committee on intramurals, recreation, and club sports will be established to work with the athletic director on expanding programs in this area.

Lawyers Set Med Exam Sessions

More than 3,000 attorneys from throughout the nation will be at The University of Michigan in Ann Arbor on March 1 and 2 to attend the 19th annual Advocacy Institute.

The program, sponsored by the Institute of Continuing Legal Education, will concern itself with the cross-examination of medical experts. In keeping with its educational approach, the Advocacy Institute will blend the theoretical and the practical, through the use of lectures, discussion panels, critical evaluation, and comparative cross-examinations, originated at the annual Advocacy Institute, are said to be the most effective and realistic method of providing new information, as three attorneys cross-examine the same witness under simulated courtroom conditions. Observers thus see a number of approaches to the same problem.

In the past two years, more than 5,000 lawyers from 49 states, every province of Canada, and Mexico have attended the Advocacy Institute, and it is expected that this year's attendance will be greatest in the institute's 19 years.

Headed by such noted attorneys as F. Lee Batley, Bill Colson, and Craig Spangenberg, the Advocacy Institute's faculty will focus its attention on four key medical specialties: the physical medicine specialist, the psychiatrist, the pathologist, and the pharmacologist.

After a lecture and discussion on each of these experts, the faculty will demonstrate step by step through comparative cross-examination how medical knowledge and legal theories should be developed in a courtroom setting.

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Brothers Star In Swim Meet
