Milliken Praises C'ville Expansion

Louis E. Schmidt, former superintendent of Clarenceville school district and now state representative, was honored Wednesday night at the dedication of the high school auditorium in his name.

Lt. Governor William G. Milliken led the host of officials who honored the Livonia lawmaker at the dedication of the Louis E. Schmidt auditorium, recently completed as part of the Clarenceville High School on Middlebelt Rd.

MILLIKEN PRAISED SCHMIDT

and the community for their interest in school planning and for "providing a full range of opportunities for all students."

"The goal of education is to prepare free men and women for responsible living in a free society. Giving them a job skill is not enough," Milliken said, indicating schools should not only teach job skills but also American ideals.

"If a man's occupation becomes his pre-occupation he is not serving society. To make the most of students, we need to equip them not only to earn a living, but to live," Milliken said.

Dr. Samuel Frisk, president of the Clarenceville Board of Education, issued praise to Schmidt and the community for helping finance, and plan and build the auditorium.

Fred Bailey, past board chief, recapped Schmidt's long career with the district, dating back to 1948.

"The people of Clarenceville have named the auditorium after Schmidt to honor his role in its creation."

BAILEY ALSO lauded Representative Schmidt's work in rebuilding the confidence in the schools within the district, which helped all the system's millage requests to pass, where before they often faced defeat.

"We here in the district knew we had the best," Bailey concluded.

Board member Thomas Wilson then presented a painting of Schmidt which will hang in the auditorium lobby.

SCHMIDT responded to the praise, and said "you don't do things by yourself," thanking the board and citizens who helped the community "pull the schools up by their bootstraps."

Schmidt served for 18 years as Clarenceville's superintendent, then quit in 1966 to successfully run for the House of Representatives seat in the 35th district.

Schmidt saw Clarenceville through its greatest period of growth.
