

British Premier In Trouble As Aide Quits

LONDON -- The resignation of Britain's Foreign Secretary George Brown, the result of a widening rift between Brown and Premier Harold Wilson which erupted over the gold crisis, threatens the Labor party government with internal crisis on top of an international one. In his resignation letter to Wilson, Brown said he had been troubled for some time by "the way this government is run and the manner in which we reach our decisions." Named to replace Brown in the foreign secretary

post was Michael Stewart. Conservative leader Edward Heath called Brown's departure "An event of major political importance," adding that "this bitter break between the two leading members of the Labor party shows the government disintegrating before our eyes."

LONDON -- Police on horseback and on foot pushed and shoved back thousands of protesting youths who tried to charge the United States Embassy Sunday in a mass protest against the war in Viet-

nam. The march was the climax of a protest that brought an estimated 10,000 to Trafalgar Square. About 20 embassy windows were broken during the demonstration. The rally was sponsored by the Vietnam Solidarity Campaign, a two-year-old organization composed of several left-wing groups.

CALCUTTA -- Gangs of Hindu and Moslems rioted Sunday as Prime Minister Indira Gandhi made an unscheduled visit to the tense city. At least three persons have been killed

and 40 injured since the turmoil began Friday. Mrs. Gandhi drove to the governor's residence to discuss ways of bringing the situation under control. She told newsmen those responsible for the rioting must be punished and said she had asked local officials to deal firmly with lawlessness.

SANTIAGO, Chile -- A bomb damaged the interior of the Chilean-North American institute at Rancagua, a mining town near Santiago over the weekend. The bombing followed a blast last Tuesday in a second-floor restroom of the U.S. Consulate in Santiago while an anti-Vietnam war demonstration was in progress.

DUBLIN -- The biggest and brightest St. Patrick's day parade of the century wound through the streets of Dublin Sunday, boosted by 15 bands and a powerful American contingent.

NUREMBERG, West Germany -- Vice Chancellor Willi Brandt and Herbert Wehner, minister of all German affairs, were shoved by left-wing ex-

trémists as they entered a hall for the opening of the Social Democratic Party congress. The chanting demonstrators also threw stones and eggs, and while SPD flag and ripped down a "welcome" poster.

CAPTOWN -- Dentist Philip Blalberg, the world's only heart-transplant survivor, returned to his home Saturday, 74 days after his operation. A bulletin issued from his home said, "Dr. Blalberg at a good lunch in his own dining room. This afternoon he slept for an hour. He is happy to be reunited

with his wife, and his condition is excellent."

PANAMA -- The National Assembly has ordered President Marcus A. Robles to stand trial March 24 after impeaching him on charges of unconstitutional political activity. The vote raised the prospect that the National Guard would step in. The impeachment proceedings stemmed from a report several weeks ago by an all-opposition assembly committee charging that Robles, 69, violated the constitution by openly supporting presidential candidate David Samudio in the campaign for the May 12 election.

World Roundup

LONDON -- Two men were charged by Scotland Yard Sunday with the murder of London financier, Michael O'Carroll, 53, and a fashion model. One of Britain's most intensive manhunt had been underway since the two victims were found tied and strangled last Wednesday.

CAIRO -- The authoritative Cairo newspaper Al-Ahram reported that President Nasser would retain his second post of premier of the United Arab Republic while "reforming" the rest of his cabinet within the next few days. There has been speculation that Nasser might give up the second post, which he holds in addition to the presidency. The president's new cabinet is expected to include more civilians than the present government in which former military officers predominate.


JERUSALEM -- Israeli and Jordanian troops exchanged gunfire across the Jordan River this weekend. Israel said the Jordanians began to fire to cover the escape of Arab infiltrators from the territory. At least one soldier was wounded.

CANTERBURY, England -- Police throughout Britain are seeking thieves who cleared the altars of the vast, nine-century-old Canterbury Cathedral of silver pieces and emptied the treasury cupboard. The burglars fled after falling to blast open the cathedral's two safes. The lost silver was estimated to be worth \$50,000. The thieves forced an iron gate into the great cloister.

PRAGUE -- Czechoslovakia's Communist President Antonin Novotny, fighting for his political life against a wave of liberalism, lost more ground over the weekend as one of his key supporters committed suicide and another resigned. Vladimir Janko, deputy defense minister, shot himself through the head just 24 hours after an urgent Cabinet discussion of the flight of Maj. Gen. Jan Sejna to the United States. Earlier, another Novotny sup-
