### FARMINGTON TOWNSHIP BOARD MINUTES

A Regular Meeting of the Farmington Township Board was held on March 11th, A.D. 1968 at the Farmington Township Hall, Farmington, Michigan. Meeting was called to order at 8:13 p.m. by Mr. Curtis Hall, Chairman. Members present were Hall, Thomas, Opperhauser, Nolan and Avery. Absent: Skillman, Nolan and Opperhauser. A very absent. Also present was Mr. Joseph Brennan, Township Attorney.

Minutes of last meetings. Minutes of Regular Meeting on February 12th, 1968 stand approved as published.

Minutes of Special Meeting of February 19th, 1968, Public Hearing on Cost Estimate for Sewer on Medbury and Henlock, stand approved as published.

Minutes of Special Meeting of Township Board on February 19th, 1968, stand approved as published.

2. Approval of Agenda. Addition — 4-A — Clarenceville School District.

4-B — Consideration of transfer of liquor license from Manuel Gorelick, Roman House, to Norman Guest.

4-C — Consideration of Detroit Edison Company franchise.

With additions as noted the Agenda stands approved as published.

4-E. Consideration of Transfer of Liquor License from Manuel Gorelick, Roman House, to Norman Guest.

MOTION by Opperhauser, supported by Nolan, that the request from Norman Guest for Class C license with Dance Permit located at 30857 Grand River (Roman House), Farmington from Manuel Gorelick be considered for approval.

Roll Call Vote: 4 Yeas, Carried-unanimous.

4-C. Consideration of Detroit Edison Company Franchise.

MOTION by Opperhauser, supported by Skillman, that the request of The Detroit Edison Company for Franchise within the Township of Farmington be referred to the Township Planning Commission for study and recommendations.

Carried-unanimous.

5. Consideration of concurring with the Oakland County Road Commission for the awarding of a contract for construction work to be done on Drake Road to Stolaruk Asphalt Paving Company, their bid being low.

Bids run from \$33,893 to \$26,101.70 for bituminous surfacing of Drake, Grand River to Eleven. Estimate was some \$33,000.

MOTION by Nolan, supported by Skillman, that the Township of Farmington concurs in the awarding of the contract for construction work to be done on Drake Road, Project No. TM-629 B, by the Oakland County Road Commission to the low bidder, Stolaruk Asphalt Paving Company, Inc. Carried-unanimous.

6. Consideration of Request to split Lot No. 1 of Woodbine Subdivision.

MOTION by Nolan, supported by Opperhauser, that Lot No. 1 of Woodbine Subdivision be split into two lots as requested, described as follows: Part of Lot 1, Woodbine Subdivision of the E 1/2 of the SW 1/4 and the W 1/2 of the SE 1/4 of Sec. 24, T1N, R3E, Farmington Twp., as recorded in Liber 58, Page 2, in Oakland Co. Records, Michigan, more particularly described as: Beginning at a point at the NW corner of Lot 1, Woodbine Subdivision, Farmington Twp., Oakland Co., Michigan; thence E 2 along the N line of said Lot 1, 267.78 ft. to the E line of said Lot 1; thence along said E line S 0 degrees 31' 20" E, 130.00 ft. to a point; thence due W 210.74 ft. to a point on the W line of said Lot 1; thence along said W line 142.72 ft. on a curve to the left, whose radius is 610.00 ft. and chord being N 24 degrees 07' 50" W, 142.44 ft. to point of beginning, containing 30,522.82 sq. ft. or 0.701 acres.

### Ridge Expansion Eyed

Five rezoning requests will be heard Thursday night, March 21, by the Farmington Township Planning Commission, with a proposed 43-acre extension of the Hunter's Ridge complex highlighting the list.

The Hunter's Ridge development of apartments and town houses at 14 Mile and Orchard Lake Rds. is one of the major projects undertaken in the northern end of the township, and also is one of the most extensively promoted.

Under discussion Thursday will be a proposal to rezone an added 43 acres from the classification of RA-1 (one-family residential) to RC-2 (multiple family).

THE BOARD also will weigh these rezoning requests:

1. For 8.27 acres at the southwest corner of 13 Mile and Middle Belt Rds. from RA-1 to RC-2 and B-2 (community business district).

2. For 10 lots in the Grand River Homes subdivision at the southwest corner of Shawwassee and Middle Belt Rds. from RA-4 (one-family residential) to B-3 (general business district) to allow construction of an automatic car wash from.

3. For 24 lots in the Glen Oaks subdivision on the east side of Orchard Lake Rd., between Bond and Fairfield, from RA-1 to B-1 (office buildings) and B-1 (vehicular parking).

Business and professional offices and service specialty shops are proposed for development if the rezoning is approved.

4. For three lots of Supervisors Middle Belt Plat No. 2 on the west side of Middle Belt Rd. between Omenwood and 10 Mile Rd. from RA-1 to B-1, B-1 (office buildings) and B-1 (vehicular parking).

Construction of offices and retail stores is planned for the area.

### Art Exhibit Includes Glick's Works

Farmington potter, John Glick will be among 22 professional artists and craftsmen who will demonstrate techniques and finished works at the first annual Westacres Art Market to be held from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m., March 23 in the Westacres Clubhouse, Commerce Rd., one mile east of Union Lake Rd., 12 Miles west of Postiac in the northwest corner of West Bloomfield Township.

Operator of the Plum Tree Pottery on 10 Mile Rd., Farmington, Glick is a full-time studio potter. His work has been displayed in most of the national ceramic and craft exhibitions and is housed in the permanent collection of the Detroit Institute of Arts. In his studio he produces custom dinner sets on commission and displays his one-of-a-kind pots.

The 27-year old artist was educated at Wayne State University and Cranbrook Academy of Art. His studio was founded on a Tiffany grant award. Other professional artists participating in the invitational show will represent a wide range of creative expression. Oil paintings, water-colors, prints, glass fusion, ceramics, welded sculpture, woodcarving, cut paper collage, mosaics, weaving and creative stitchery are among the media to be presented.


### Boy To Dance Highland Fling

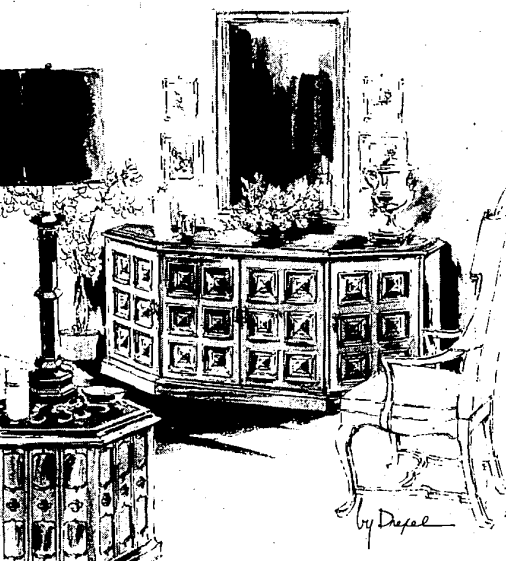
