AAUW Has Voice On Council

Mrs. Eugene Schoemich will represent the Farmington branch of the American Association of University Women on a steering committee formed with an eye to developing an Oakland County Arts Coordinating Council.

The committee is chaired by John Carlisle, assistant director of community services at Oakland Community College. The group has applied to the Michigan State Council for the Arts for a \$2,500 grant to hire a part-time person who can evaluate programs.

Area Blood Donors Can Aid Sally

An appeal for blood donors for a five-year-old Waterford Township girl, hospitalized since last September with a blood deficiency which contributes to uncontrolled hemorrhaging, has met with overwhelming response.

She is Sally Harrington, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Emanuel Harrington. Sally has aplastic anemia, a condition in which a blood component producing clotting is lacking. The slightest bruise will produce a hemorrhage.

The child, in St. Joseph Mercy Hospital at Pontiac, presently requires 50 pints of new blood a week and at the time the appeal for blood donors was made earlier this week her parents had been billed for \$60 units used in transfusions. (The commercial cost of a pint of blood is from \$22.50 to \$25.)

A Red Cross official later this week, however, reported the \$60 pints had been replaced by donors answering the appeal.
