

Death Toll Mounts In Indiana Gunpowder Blast

RICHMOND, Ind. — The count stood at 43 dead and a number of persons injured or missing Monday as authorities eagerly searched through the rubble of the basement of the Marting Arms Co. sporting goods store.

An explosion emanated from the basement Saturday night and destroyed nearly two city blocks of the downtown section of the city, State Police said that the basement contained a stock of gunpowder that was being held for sale to hunters and sport shooters. In regard to the search for those killed in the blast, authorities com-

mented, "We've got a long way to go."

NEW ORLEANS — Saturday, H. Rap Brown, chairman of the Student Nonviolent Coordinating

Committee succeeding Stokely Carmichael to that post last year, was whisked to somewhere in Virginia for extradition to Maryland, the U.S. Marshall's office in New Orleans reported.

Brown, who had been jailed in New Orleans on charges of violating travel restrictions imposed by a federal court, was moved sometime Saturday. The secret move was in keeping with federal regulations regarding movement of federal prisoners. Brown is facing charges of inciting to riot and to commit arson in Maryland.

TUSKEGEE, Ala. — It took the "Alabama National Guard Saturday to free 12 prominent Tuskegee Institute trustees who had been locked in a campus guest house and held hostage by angry Negro students for several hours.

About 300 national guardsmen and 70 state troopers arrived on the campus but found it quiet. The students had already released their captives, who included retired Gen. Lucius Clay and Rep. Francis Bolton (R-O.). Clay said, "This wasn't connected with the murder of Dr. King but was

simply an uprising of students who wanted to take over the campus." The university was founded by Booker T. Washington.

LOUISVILLE, Colo. — Mayor Frank Rizzi snipped a 50-foot-long length of spaghetti to open a new Colorado highway recently rather than the traditional ribbon used on such occasions. The strand of spaghetti was three inches wide. Many of Louisville's residents are of Italian descent.

ALBANY, N.Y. — Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller appealed to the New York State Legislature Sunday to enact a wide variety of social legislation swiftly as a tribute to the memory of the slain civil rights leader, Dr. Martin Luther King Jr.

"We cannot honor him merely by our tears. We must honor him—and the principles for which he died—by our actions," the governor said.

PALM BEACH, Fla. — A hotel bus boy, bleeding from

two bullet wounds, plunged to his death early Sunday after he was shot twice in the side near the heart while attempting to climb into the bed from where a former New York policeman and his wealthy, ex-show-girl wife were sleeping, police reported.

Police identified the dead man as John Prior, 23, a Brighton, Mass. Police said that the man was obviously trying to enter the home of Mr. and Mrs. Daniel Moran, Mrs. Moran was the fifth wife of late Horace Dodge II of the family who made a fortune in the automobile industry.

Moran said Prior as he was discovered climbing through the upstairs bedroom window.

CINCINNATI — Nearly 100 policemen converged on a discount department store being burglarized Sunday and arrested three men, but before staging a gunfight with one of them.

Louis Wren, 24, of Cincinnati, was arrested, after a three-hour gun battle on three charges of shooting to kill a police officer and one charge of burglary. Jack Williams, 24, and Noah Cade, 23, of Cincinnati, were apprehended as they tried to flee the scene of the incident and were charged with burglary.

LA SALLE, Ill. — Two Indiana men were arrested Saturday and charged with burglarizing an Illinois Power Co. service unit in LaSalle. Police said Milford Knarman, 39, of Valparaiso, Ind., and Laverne Sawyer, 32, of East Gary, Ind., had 1,700 pounds of copper wire in their rental truck. Police said Knarman has \$20,000 cash with him when the two were arrested.

Romney Seeks Better Police Race Balance

LANSING — Gov. Romney will meet with the mayors and police chiefs of Michigan cities soon to discuss ways of bringing a better racial balance to police departments.

Romney last week instructed the state Civil Rights Commission to make a study of city police departments and report back promptly. The governor acted during a meeting with CRC and Negro leaders. The meeting was prompted by tension following the assassination of Dr. Martin Luther King.

State And Local News Round Up

DETROIT — The council of newspapers unions has rejected Mayor Cavanagh's request to restrain publication of the Detroit News and Free Press during the current racial crisis. The unions said, however, that they would be willing to bargain around-the-clock.

Cavanagh held out little hope for an early settlement of the strike, which has shut down the two metropolitan papers since mid-November.

DETROIT — Gales of wind up to 63 miles an hour ripped through Pontiac and Grand Rapids, and other areas of Michigan had 58 mile winds Monday in a Great Lakes-region wind storm. The winds ranged from Cedar Rapids, Ia., to Chicago and South Bend.

LANSING — A federal judge has enjoined the City of Lansing from granting any cable television franchises until it can determine whether the city has power to regulate it.

Judge Noel F. Fox also continued a circuit court injunction prohibiting Wendarian Ventures, Inc. from installing cable television in Lansing. That firm prompted the court test by starting installation of a cable system in January in defiance of a city ordinance requiring a franchise.

LANSING — The State Department of Education has created an advisory committee on parent-student-school relationships. "Schools are increasingly at the center of conflict involving rules of conduct, dress, grooming, personal behavior and discipline," said Dr. Ira Polley, superintendent of public instruction.

LANSING — The House defeated a bill that would have killed a law requiring boats towing a water skier to have an observer in addition to a driver. Thus, water skiers must continue to use observers.

KALAMAZOO — Western Michigan University President James W. Miller bowed to the demands of some 400 Negro students who had held the Student Center most of the day Friday by saying white America, including WMU, must "bear our share of the burden and the guilt" of the slaying of Dr. Martin Luther King.

LANSING — School district voters are being asked May 9 to approve a four mill tax increase for school operations. The school board made that request only two years after voters approved a 17 mill five-year request.

A new teacher contract, awaiting ratification by the teachers and the school board, raises starting salaries from the present \$6,100 base to \$6,825 for a beginner with a B.A. degree.

CHARLOTTE — Gerald A. Atkins, 22, of Lansing, last week was found guilty by an Eaton County circuit court jury of the murder of a deputy sheriff on Jan. 1, 1967, at a service station. He will be sentenced in two weeks.

Atkins' companion, Jerry Talison, 26, also of Lansing, is serving a life term for the slaying of an attendant in the service station. Atkins was returned to Michigan after being captured in New York City a few weeks after the slaying.

Receives NSF Stipend For Wayne Course
