State Road Chiefs Hit Township Split

LANSING -- The State Highway Commission said it is opposed to the diversion of motor vehicle highway funds to townships.

The diversion, as proposed in two bills before the roads and bridges committee of the House of Representatives, would reduce the department's share of the fund from 46 to 44 per cent, about \$7 million annually, the commission said.

The bills also proposed diversion of motor vehicle funds from the counties to the townships, reducing the county share from 34 to 32 per cent.

Under the new distribution formula established by the legislature last year when the Good Roads Tax Package was enacted, the highway department receives 46 per cent of the fund, counties 34 per cent, and incorporated cities and villages 20 per cent.

In a recent resolution, the commission said that Public Act 51 of 1961, as amended, provides that the state highway commission conduct a continuing highway study to determine the road and street needs throughout the state.

"Such studies have been made cooperatively with Michigan's counties, cities and villages, and have produced recommendations used by the Legislature as the basis for legislation providing for the distribution of highway funds to the several highway agencies," the commission said.

"HOUSE BILLS 3565 and 3606 would create an imbalance in the distribution formula by allocating a portion of these restricted highway funds to townships for local road use."

"Reduction in funds would place a severe handicap on the Department of State Highways' ability to meet the state's critical highway needs, thereby seriously affecting state and local economies."

The Commission urged the Legislature "to defeat these measures and any other proposal which would reduce the funds allocated to the Department of State Highways by Act No. 51, Public Acts of 1961, as amended."

Save The Children Group Starts Emergency Fund

An Emergency Fund has been set-up for sponsored children and their families by the Board of Directors of Save the Children Federation, it was announced recently in Newark, Conn. by E.C. Kip Finch, board chairman.

The purpose of this fund is to provide small emergency grants or loans to sponsored children and their families as a means of helping them to meet unusual and unforeseen critical situations.

This type of funding has been tried by the Federation on an experimental basis through its Field Offices in Korea and Tanzania. According to Finch, it has been found that although such funds have been quite limited they offered a new dimension to the Field Offices to come to the aid of sponsored children and their families faced with problems they could not personally solve.

EXAMPLES of how emergency funds have brought new hope and encouragement to sponsored children and their families in Korea and Tanzania include a loan of \$50 for school fees and uniform to a child awaiting a Federation scholarship grant; a grant for \$7 to a student for eyeglasses which later made a marked improvement in the child's classroom work and purchase of a forty dollar wheelchair for a handicapped boy in order that he could enroll in a local school.

Because of the success with the trial operations in Korea and Tanzania, all Federation Field Offices are now being allocated one dollar, to be earmarked for Emergency Fund, for each existing sponsorship as of January first of each year. This allocation will be in addition to the amount of benefit payments to those who are sponsored.

In addition, additional funds may be received directly by Field Offices from interested sponsors and contributors to the Federation. Funds for this purpose sent to Field Offices will be classified Emergency Fund.

THE FEDERATION has Field Offices in Albuquerque, New Mexico which also administers a new program in Baja, California, Mexico; Beaufort, Kentucky; Knoxville, Tennessee; Bogota, Colombia; Helsinki, Finland; Rome, Italy; Paris, France; Athens, Greece; Dar es Salaam, Tanzania; Seoul, Korea; Davao, Cebu, and Nhon, South Vietnam; Santo Domingo, Dominican Republic; and Tegucigalpa, Honduras.

Persons who wish to contribute to the Emergency Fund may also do so through the Federation's headquarters. Contributions should be marked Emergency Fund, Save the Children Federation, 1000 Broadway, Newark, Conn., 06452.

KALAMAZOO -- Four players from the Mid-American Conference head the all-opponent team selected by the Western Michigan University varsity basketball team.

Picked from the M.A.C. were Walt Platkowski of Bowling Green, Fred Foster of Miami, George Stone of Marshall and Steve Mix of Toledo. The only outsider to make the team was George Terry of Illinois State.

All played key roles in helping to defeat the Broncs in at least one game during the season. Terry, a 6-0 guard, was the toughest player for the Broncs to handle, scoring 39 points when Illinois State challenged the Broncs, 90-88.

Platkowski had efforts of 27 and 20 points against W.M.U. while Foster went for 22 and 26, Stone 34 and 26 and Mix 22 and 28.

The Broncs finished with an 11-13 regular season record and placed fourth in the M.A.C. with a 5-7 record.




