

Michigan To Go On Daylight Time

MICHIGAN -- Like it or not, Michigan will again this year be on Daylight Saving Time for six months.

The time change occurs at 1 a.m. Sunday morning, April 28, when clocks are to be moved ahead one hour. That, according to law, is the moment when the switch is to be made officially from 1 a.m. Eastern Standard Time to 2 a.m. Eastern Daylight Saving Time.

State And Local News Round Up

LANSING -- The State Administrative Board has broadened its efforts to eliminate discrimination practices in employment among bidders for state contracts.

In a resolution adopted Tuesday, the board said it would rely on the State Civil Rights Commission to check for compliance with non-discrimination employment requirements among prospective bidders before contracts are awarded.

DETROIT -- The American Insurance Association on Tuesday that the 1957 summer riots in Newark and Detroit resulted in \$50 million property loss. The association estimated loss in Newark at \$15.5 million and in Detroit at \$64.3 million.

Czechs Claim Soviets Murdered Masaryk

PRAGUE -- The official Communist Party newspaper, Rude Pravo, has suggested for the first time that Soviet agents may have been responsible for the death of Jan Masaryk in 1948. Rude Pravo said that Masaryk, the foreign minister, was murdered, but that it may have been the Soviet secret police, under the direction of Laurenti Beria, who ordered and carried out the killing.

LONDON -- Fast-working thieves stole \$67,200 from a parked armored car while the guards were picking up cash from a store. The thieves unlocked the rear door and inner security door, took out several bags of coins and notes, relocked the outer door, and escaped. It all took five minutes.

Frank Wolf, a national leader of the Socialist German Student League, said in Frankfurt that no actions against the conservative Axel Springer publishing chain were planned for the week.

MOSCOW -- The Soviet Union charged last week that five U.S. military attaches and one from Canada had pushed too hard at their intelligence-gathering missions and entered the area of "open espionage" at a shipyard and military base last week. The United States strongly denounced the charges as completely false along with its Canadian counterpart. The five are: American, Lt. Col. Robert Hamer, Harrisburg, Pa.; Lt. Col. Ralph N. Chanell, Darien, Conn.; Marine Lt. Col. Wayne E. Richards, Colusa, Calif.; Lt. Col. Hugo W. Watson, Ballston Spa, N.Y.; and Lt. Col. Gerard L. Jacobson, Terrace, Minn.; Canadian, Lt. Col. H.V. Watson.
