any other kind loads or parcels, at any time or on any exhibit on the premises occupied by the restaurant, whether or not the restaurant is open for business; however, the owner or operator of a restaurant may use a public address system to give instructions to employees on the premises, but the instructions so given shall not be loud enough to cause any noise or disturbance to the premises of such Drive-In Restaurants.

Section 9. Hereafter and hereinafter, no person shall be permitted to park or to leave a vehicle on any portion of a Drive-In Restaurant while parking or to sit adjacent to the premises thereof or to sit adjacent to the premises of such restaurant, to race the motor of any car, to loudly start or stop any car, or to use any horn or other device which causes a loud or unnecessary noise. It shall also be unlawful for any person of a Drive-In Restaurant to use any public address system to give instructions to employees on the premises of such restaurant.

Section 13. Penalty. Any person guilty of violating any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be deemed to be a misdemeanor and shall be fined not more than One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars or imprisoned for not more than thirty (30) days, or be given both the punishment and imprisonment at the discretion of the Court.

Section 14. Separability. If any section, sub-section, sentence, clause, phrase, or portion of this ordinance for any reason shall be held to be invalid, such invalidity shall not affect the validity of the remaining portions hereof. This ordinance was introduced.
