

Health-O-Rama Offers Free Medical Tests At Westland

More than 30 educational and scientific exhibits together with 12 free medical tests will be offered Western Wayne residents at Health-O-Rama scheduled May 16 through 18 at Westland Shopping Center.

Open from 11 a.m. to 9 p.m. daily in the central mall, the Health-O-Rama will be the second in a series planned for Oakland, Wayne and Macomb residents by Women for the United Foundation (WUF) in cooperation with the United Health Organization (UHO).

The first Health-O-Rama was held last week in the special events building of Northland Shopping Center, Southfield.

WUF's PRESIDENT, Mrs. R. Jamison Williams, of Birmingham, said the Health-O-Rama series is planned to focus attention on the importance of annual physical examinations as a safeguard to health.

"Because the health of every member of our community is a common concern," Mrs. Williams said, "we must work together to assure early de-

tection and prompt treatment of illness for all."

The WUF president said the Health-O-Ramas will familiarize Oakland, Wayne and Macomb residents with the resources offered through Torch Drive agencies and other community resources.

"The series is an ambitious undertaking made possible through UHO's effectiveness in bringing together diverse community health resources, both public and private," Mrs. Williams said.

THE NEWLY-FORMED UHO, created last summer and supported through a grant from the United Foundation, has undertaken a comprehensive health planning in the tri-county area.

UHO seeks a strong, working partnership among all health agencies. It is concerned with all matters relating to health including facilities, manpower,

services and budgeting. WUF is a 22,000-member organization of both Torch Drive volunteers and community leaders who plan specific programs and activities to promote the aims, purposes and ideals of the UHO on a year-round basis.

RESPONSIBLE FOR planning the Westland event are Mrs. Michael Tink, of Allen Park, WUF unit chairman for Western Wayne, and Mrs. Thomas P. Dore, of Dearborn, Western Wayne area Health-O-Rama chairman.

At each Health-O-Rama, free screening tests will be offered for anemia, blood pressure, cancer, cholesterol, diabetes, glaucoma, hearing, height and weight, oral cavity and vision along with a chest X-ray which will be checked for lung cancer, emphysema, enlarged heart and tuberculosis.

Tests will be administered by physicians associated with the health agencies assisted by volunteer medical technologists and student nurses from Detroit area schools of nursing. Test reports will be mailed to the individual participants' private physicians.

JOINING WITH WUF and the UHO as co-sponsors of the series are Detroit District Dental Society, Detroit Society of Medical Technologists which will provide more than 80 volunteers to assist with testing, Macomb County Medical Society, Michigan Association of Osteopathic Physicians and Surgeons.
