

Township Trash Pickup

A special pickup of household rubbish will be made Saturday, May 4 in all of Farmington Township between Eighth and Nine Mile Rds. Residents are instructed to put discarded trash at the side of their road, but no garbage is to be included. Any papers must be bundled and tied, and if old refrigerators are thrown away the owners must make sure all doors have been removed. This will be the first of three special pickups and will include residences along the south side of Nine Mile. On May 11 workers will conduct a similar cleanup drive between Nine and 11 Mile Rds., covering the northern strip of the township May 18.

Nearly 130 area Boy Scout troops, who will spend May learning mapping skills, will take part later in the month in a "baseline hike." 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OCC Contract Talks Hit Impasse On Teacher-Load

After three all-day meetings last week, contract negotiations between faculty and administrators at Oakland Community College have broken off. At issue is student loads on individual OCC faculty members and teachers. The faculty proposed last fall that teachers should teach about 110 students per term. OCC Faculty Association president, Mrs. Christine Harris, associate professor of economics, has stated that some teachers are now handling a maximum of 300 students.

OCC press chief, Mitchell Tender, told The Enterprise & Observer that working out OCC faculty loads is difficult because of the college's academic make-up. OCC is known as a "non-traditional" school operating without structured classes and with study laboratories open from 8 a.m. to 10 p.m. Tender said that because the concept is so new, primary matters like class loads have to be "felt out." Major item yet to be resolved in contract talks is faculty salaries. Trustees indicated last fall that 1966-69 OCC faculty salaries were not as competitive as schools such as Macomb Community College, where teachers received a \$1,300-a-year increase at that time. Mrs. Harris said that a raise amounting to more than \$1,500 would have to be given at OCC to just bring salaries up to the level of other community colleges in southeastern Michigan. The fourth largest community college in Michigan, OCC has a current salary range of \$6,500 for beginning master's degree teachers to \$15,250 for 10-month work year. Teacher contracts for this school year expire today, May 1.
