a cooperative education program has "some distinct advantages over other high school students, because he has already begun to make the difficult transition from school to work."

Dr. Leon J. Alger, vice president for program development for Howard and Smith, Inc., a Royal Oak distributor of industrial education equipment, spoke Tuesday evening to the first annual banquet for Livonia co-op students.

A tongue twister for the participants, the occasion was officially tagged: First Annual Employer-Employee Banquet of the Livonia Public Schools Cooperative Occupational Training Program. The co-op program is directed by Arlie Fairman, coordinator of vocational education instruction.

The event had originally been scheduled for April 5, with Dr. Robert C. Lusk, of the Automobile Manufacturer's Association, as guest speaker.

Explains DIT Co-Op Program Advantages

"College students and even college-bound high school graduates usually take summer jobs of the 'pick-and-shovel' variety which do nothing to advance their education or their career development."

This observation by the director of cooperative education at The Detroit Institute of Technology, Dr. A. Johnides, was made as he viewed the approach of summer and the "wasted opportunities" ahead for Detroit's college students.

"Many students are not aware of the distinct advantages in the cooperative education program which provides an opportunity to work in the field of their chosen college majors, often at salaries approximating those of college graduates."

More importantly, however, summer employment is not a haphazard job that merely provides spending money or tuition for the next semester. Cooperative employment is always planned in direct relationship with the student's academic program," Johnides said.

Scholarships are now available at DIT to enable qualified applicants to obtain \$500 for tuition and expenses in the second semester to complete the freshman year. Immediate summer employment is obtained for recipients of the scholarships.

working lives, and that the ability to relate to people is dependent on an individual's value system.

He noted that many students today seem to have rejected the established social value system, but that the issue of importance was what values young people would adapt for themselves.

Alger suggested four questions for students and adults to ponder, explaining that the answers were fundamental to the evolution of a personal value system:

1. Do you believe that every human individual has importance, worth and dignity?
2. Do you believe that the uniqueness of each individual is to be respected?
3. Do you believe that each person has the right to think as he chooses, although not necessarily the right to act as he chooses?
4. Do you believe that every person born has a right to equal rights and opportunity?

"Throughout the cooperative program, the employment period alternates with on-campus academic semesters, a method which provides a close coordination of work experience with classroom theory. This unique opportunity for analysis and insight by the student sharpens motivation and the cooperative students gain a greater understanding of people and importance of human relations," the DIT educator said.

Cooperative education is now approaching its second year at DIT. However, the cooperative concept of work and study was originated in 1906 at the University of Cincinnati. It was first established with work and study alternating on a weekly basis, but experience proved that the traditional semester or quarter system common to educational institutions was most effective. In the past 60 years some 100 of the nation's institutions of higher learning have adopted cooperative education programs.

At DIT, cooperative education has several distinctive advantages over other local institutions—students need not wait for student standing but may enroll as sophomores; the program is offered to full-time students in all three colleges; Arts and Sciences, Business Administration and Engineering.
