Meantime, Dan McLellan equaled the RU varsity record in the high jump of 5 feet, 11 3/4". The mark originally was set by Mike Brown in 1960.

John Morrison continued his brilliant effort in the high hurdles with a winning time of 14.8 seconds while Mike Headline went 12 feet, one inch to place second in the pole vault.
