

Symphony LWV Gives Book On Cities To Play To Human Relations Group

The Roman Catholic Archdiocese of Detroit has just given permission for the Detroit Symphony to play a concert May 16 from the altar of Sacred Heart Church in nearby Dearborn.

This will be the first time a major American Symphony Orchestra has appeared at the altar and sanctuary of a church. A group of private citizens from Dearborn, all members of this church, who call themselves "83 for the Symphony," is sponsoring the project. One concert will be held for the children of the parish at 2 p.m. Another will be held for adult parishioners at 8 p.m. These concerts will be conducted by the Symphony's conductor, Walter Papp, and will consist of standard symphony repertoire including Beethoven's 4th Symphony.

As many members of the Symphony as will fit in the sanctuary, at least more than 50, will play. The sanctuary and altar are large with a huge suspended crucifix as the dominant focal point. The church seats about 1,000.

A new book on American cities, prepared for the League of Women Voters in the United States, has been presented by the Livonia LWV to the Livonia Human Relations Commission.

Titled "Crisis: The Condition of the American City" the book was prepared by Urban America, Inc.

THE PENETRATING analysis of the city today comes off the press at a particularly crucial time—just following the President's message to Congress calling for extensive legislative action if the nation's cities are to be saved in their struggle for survival.

The city will not be transformed, the President emphasized in his message, "until the lives of the least among its dwellers are changed as well."

What are these changes that we so desperately need? What has happened over the years to create the blight, the despair, the poverty, the squalor, the mid-of-plenty that characterize the slum-ghetto? It is too late to make our cities desirable places to live in, rather than to escape from?

"Crisis: The Condition of the American City" reviews what has happened to our centers of population over the past half century, analyzes possible new directions they may take—even discusses forthrightly self-determination; the structuring of a help format for crisis situations; and the mobilizing and training of activists within the denomination.

The Unitarian Universalist denomination — predominantly white and small in numbers—has an historical background in the fight for human dignity and justice for all colors and races, dating back to the abolitionist movement a century ago when Unitarians and Universalists were actively involved in rescuing fugitive slaves.

Tom Dooley Loretto Plans Foundation To Receive \$500

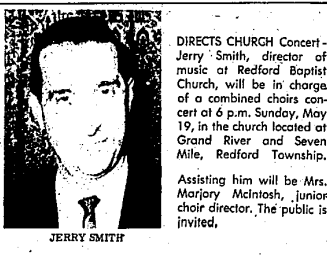

Members of the Universalist-Unitarian Church of Farmington will join other U-U's in the Detroit area in a convocation of concern for racial and social problems planned Sunday, May 19, in the Detroit Institute of Arts auditorium.

The program includes a worship service, at 10:30 a.m. and afternoon caucuses in the McGregor Institute and the Wayne State University law school building.

Robert M. Eddy, minister of the Farmington church, is president of the U-U Council of Michigan, which is heading the convocation, and several members of the local congregation, will take active roles.

MRS. PATRICIA MORRILL, of Livonia, will be in charge of special programs for children aged kindergarten to third grade, and Mrs. Carol Myntik, of Farmington, is arranging a special afternoon session for junior highs. Programs enabling youngsters in fourth, fifth and sixth grades also are being set up.

Eddy said up to 1,200 are expected to participate, and added: "The death of Martin Luther King made most of us aware of

how very, very late it is to do whatever it is we must do. It is to discover what our religious liberals might do that we have planned this unique convocation."

"The Negro in America wants everything that the white American has taken for granted for hundreds of years. He wants nothing more, but will accept nothing less."
