## City Newcomers Celebrate 10th Year

Plymouth has a 10-year-old that, in the last decade, has grown from infancy to a healthy, friendly, energetic "child."

The Plymouth Newcomers Club, which was founded in 1957 by Mrs. Byron Champion, is a gracious blend of new people in the Plymouth community, interest groups and friendship.

These three ingredients are apparently nourishing because the "child" is now fully grown and has an impressive membership of 285.

THE PURPOSE OF THE Newcomers Club is like a warm handshake.

"To bring together, in friendly fellowship, people who are newcomers to the Plymouth area; to help make them feel that Plymouth is a fine place in which to live; and, insofar as possible, to introduce newcomers to this community and its various facilities."

"It's virtually impossible to find all the new people in the city," said Mrs. Beverly Brooks, president of the Newcomers, "but we try."

They try through every means available: the Welcome Wagon, real estate offices, this newspaper and neighborhood grapevines.

We publicize our membership luncheons and are now giving five coffees a year," said Mrs. Brooks.

The club has been keeping pace with Plymouth in its rapid growth and membership, which at one time lasted three years, and has, of necessity, been shortened to two.

While all other officers in the club are elected, Newcomer vice-presidents automatically become presidents the following year, and then act in an advisory capacity during the third year.

MRS. BROOKS will officially relinquish her gavel next month to the club's current vice president, Mrs. Robert Weideman.

"Newcomers has meant a lot to me," said Mrs. Brooks. "We came from a small town in Ohio, and it seemed that you had to be a resident there for 20 years before you were accepted as a part of the community."

"When we came to Plymouth, I vowed that it would be different. As it turned out, it has been wonderfully so—and I'll miss it," she said.

MRS. WEIDEMAN is excited about her new job and her vice-presidential duties have prepared her for next season's work.

As vice president she has served as general chairman of Newcomers 13 interest groups.

During the season's first membership luncheon, the chairman of each interest group makes a centerpiece depicting the activity of her individual group. Prospective members are then able to lunch with those who share a common interest.

The groups "cover a wide range of activities. Women who are new to the community may find friends in the gourmet cooking, bridge, knitting, antiques, crafts, decoupage, pinocle, or reading groups.

Active young women may apply for women's bowling, couple's bowling, ballroom dancing or golf.

There is even a weight watchers group.

As interests change, so do the groups. If there are many people interested in one subject there may be two groups covering a single activity.

"We had a great many members interested in crafts and gourmet cooking this year," said Mrs. Brooks, "and now have three groups that are double."

HER VICE-PRESIDENTIAL year was described by Mrs. Weideman as a "fun" year and one that will make her forthcoming presidency much easier.

The Weidemans have lived in Plymouth for two years and were newcomers from Rhodessa, where Mr. Weideman was a controller for Ford Motor Co.

He is now working in Ford's Dearborn offices, and the family chose Plymouth because, said Mrs. Weideman, "we love a small town."

There are three young Weidemans—Paul, a junior and Drake, a sophomore at Plymouth High School and Karen, a seventh grader.

"This is the first place we've lived where there has been a club of this type, and it certainly serves a useful purpose by cushioning the shock of coming into a new community," said Mrs. Weideman.

IT IS IMPOSSIBLE to estimate the number of lasting friendships formed in Newcomers, but it is relatively easy to divide 285 new Plymouth residents into 13 interest groups and come up with an answer that is an asset to the community.
