Among the items approved were:

Scout-O-Rama Offers World Custom Exhibit

One of the major attractions of Scout-O-Rama '68, the huge Detroit Area Council Boy Scout show that will take place at Michigan State Fairgrounds on June 7, 8 and 9, will be the World Friendship Pavilion built around the large pool at the Fairgrounds.

Hundreds of Cubs, Scouts, Explorers and leaders will depict Scouting skills, customs and traditions of 23 nations in the World Friendship show area. Included will be Mexico, Chile, Japan, Greece, Italy, France, Thailand, Austria, Norway, Ghana, England, the Congo and the Netherlands.

SMALL CHILDREN who visit the show will be offered a ride in an authentic Chinese rickshaw pulled by members of Scout Troop 254, Redford District, who will also offer mothers genuine Chinese rice and other oriental dish recipes. Scouts from Troop 280, Sunset District, will decorate themselves with body paint and colorful costumes as they present an exciting Mexican bullfight skit complete with gaily costumed toreros and a fierce boy-sized bull.

Of special interest to all present and past Scouts and Scout leaders will be the historic Brownsea Island Camp reenacted by the Scouts of Troop 204, Greenfield District. Brownsea Island was the site of the very first Boy Scout campout ever held by the founders of the Scouting program, Lord Baden-Powell, back in 1907. The members of Troop 204 will be clad in the traditional and clothes of that era.

The fates of Robin Hood and his merry band will be portrayed by Troop 89 of Cadillac Square District, and they'll even be fashioning their own bows and arrows at the show.

They couldn't borrow the Leaning Tower of Pisa, so the Scouts of Troop 1426 did the next best thing, they've constructed a gondola which will ply the waters of the reflecting pool as they give small fry an Italian boat ride. Sailing the same waters will be a dugout canoe fashioned by members of Troop 1630, Michigan District, as they bring the Philippines to the Fairgrounds.

Scout officials indicate that nearly 30,000 Scouts and leaders will participate in the show.

Chrysler Distributes Savings

DETROIT -- Approximately \$25.7 million in Chrysler Corporation common stock, U.S. Savings Bonds and cash will be shared this week by 8,351 salaried Chrysler employees under the Chrysler Corporation Thrift-Stock Ownership Program.

These assets, accrued in the 1963 Class, which matured April 30, represent a return of \$4.92 for each \$1 saved by employees. Under the program, salaried employees with one year of service may invest up to 10 per cent of their base salaries. Currently, 50 per cent of the employee's investment is used to purchase U.S. Savings Bonds and 50 per cent is applied to purchase Chrysler common stock. The employee's savings used to buy stock is matched by the corporation to buy additional stock. Normal distribution occurs five years after the close of the Class year.

About 53 per cent of the participants in the 1963 Class elected to receive all of their assets totaling \$12.3 million. The remaining participants will receive U.S. Savings Bonds totaling \$2.0 million and will leave their stock totaling \$11.4 million, in the program until retirement.

Since the beginning of the Thrift-Stock Ownership Program in 1956, \$119.6 million in assets have been distributed or held until retirement for salaried employees of Chrysler.

Burroughs Promotes Sheaffer

L.M. Sheaffer, Jr., has been named manager of facilities planning for Burroughs Corporation's Business Machines Group. Sheaffer will be responsible for planning, coordinating, evaluating and implementation of new facility programs.
