

Drysdale Sets Mark For Blanking Foes

LOS ANGELES -- Big Don Drysdale of the Los Angeles Dodgers pitched his string of scoreless innings to 58 2/3 when defeating the Philadelphia Phillies 5-3.

Drysdale's performance erased Walter Johnson's 55-year-old mark of 56 straight scoreless innings from the record book. Drysdale had six shutouts in his string.

Drysdale allowed 4 1/3 innings against Philadelphia and was credited with his eighth victory of the season against three losses.

INDIANAPOLIS -- Billie Casper posted a two-under-par 70 in the final round to win the \$10,000 Indianapolis Open with a 172-hole score of 260, which was his fourth triumph on the professional tour this year.

It's a baseball rarity-nine players on the field who were scouted, signed and developed by one major league club.

But it happens for the Tigers very often these days—regularly, when they are facing a left-handed pitcher and have either Mike Ilitch or Tom Sturdivant of the mound for Detroit.

The first time was April 13, when the Tigers defeated the Chicago White Sox, 5-3. Every Tiger starter that day was a

product of the Detroit scouting system.

ON THE FIELD were Mickey Stanley, Dick McAuliffe, Ray Oyler and Don Wert in the infield; Al Kaline, Willie Horton and Bill Freehling in the outfield; Bill Freehling and

Sparks on the mound. All but Kaline, who never played a game of minor league baseball, worked their way up through the Tiger farm system.

FIFTEEN OF THE current 25 Tigers were scouted and signed by the Detroit organization. Nine of the 15 were signed when Campbell headed

the farm system. Of the other 10, five were acquired through trades and five were drafted. Don Lund succeeded Campbell in 1962 and now heads department that watches over six minor league clubs and over 140 players under contract.



Restaurants, Hotels Rated By Mobil

Mobil Oil has released its revised Mobil Travel Guide for 1968, it is announced by Frank V. Shellenback, general manager, Great Lakes Division.

This year's edition features approximately 1,500 lodges and dining facilities listed and rated for the first time. All of the 22,000 establishments rated in last year's edition have been reappraised by Mobil's inspectors and several hundred have had their ratings up or downgraded.

Mobil's rating system involves an appraisal of several factors, such as their inspection reports which are checked against Mobil's backlog of questionnaires recording readers' comments on recommended establishments.

THE FIVE STAR rating system accords one star for "good", two stars for "very good", three stars for "excellent", four stars for "outstanding", worth a special trip"; and five stars for "one of the best in the country".
