

Baker Gets 2 Posts

To Tour Europe With Band

Farmington's State Representative Raymond L. Baker has been named vice-chairman of two special Michigan House of Representatives committees on water pollution problems by House Speaker Robert E. Waldron.

One study will center on methods of financing sewage treatment facilities, while the other will specifically look into the problems of phosphate pollutants of water resources.

Four other House members were appointed to work on the committees with Baker.

They are Representatives Raymond J. Smith (R-Ann Arbor), Edgar A. Goerlings (R-Muskegon), William R. Cope-land (D-Wyandotte) and Joseph M. Sawyer (D-St. Clair Shores).

Baker is chairman of the House Conservation and Recre-ation Committee, a position which makes him a key figure in all pollution control legisla-tion.

"The unusual appointment of the same members to two com-mittees will be beneficial be-cause they are closely re-lated," Baker said. "This is a creative way to assure the most efficient and productive analysis of the two areas as possible."

The dual studies are sched-uled for completion prior to the 1969 legislative session.
