

# Wood Creek's Young People Have Fun At Village Events.

By 1964, the Village of Wood Creek Farms had become the home and playground for so many young people, that, with the efforts of Peggy By and the help of Berna Trout, Shirley Champagne, Gerry Riggs, Ann Perry and the deCooks, plans were made for the first special event which I reported the first week of December 1964, as follows: "There certainly is a population explosion in Wood Creek. Seventy junior Wood Creeker reservations were made for the Halloween party ---. The young people gathered

at 4:30 pm. with a Tyghem truck for transportation - at Westmont Court. "They were divided into three groups: the pre-schoolers, the six to ten year olds and the teenagers. The first event was a parade and the judging of costumes -- The bonfire was built in the circle in Westmont Court -- Ben and Bev Ludwig offered their barn for the spook show ---. There were special games and activities which included apple bobbing, pie eating and a pumpkin Pinata. "Thanks to the excellent planning by so many parents and lots of work, this will be a Halloween long to be remem-

bered - and probably repeated." OTHER ACTIVITIES were tried out. In 1964, they tried Christmas caroling. They are planning this year to try a Christmas tree lighting ceremony. When the skating was at its best, they had a skating party at the Perrys which all en-

joyed and it has become an annual event. In June of 1965, the first Family Fun Day was planned for June 12th to be held at the home of the McGraths on Wellington, and I wrote of it "Our Junior Wood Creekers are making plans for a good

time to be had by everyone regardless of age, sex or marital status." So began what is now an integral and very important part of the Wood Creek social life. The Men's Civic Association

sponsored that first Halloween party and now a part of our association dues is used to finance the three established annual events - the Family Fun Day in June, the Halloween party and a winter skating party.

Miss Engelbrecht, Miss O'Dell, and Mr. Zimler received special recognition for achieving 4.0 (straight A) grade point averages.


