

Seven State Parks Closed For Season

The conservation department's parks division announces seven state parks have been closed for the season.

Suspending activities until next year are Aloha, Bonzie, Bloomer, One, D. H. Day, Gladwin, Neura and White Cloud parks.

Other park and recreation areas will remain open to the public as long as weather or until winter conditions necessitate shutting off water to keep pipes from freezing. However, those with winter sports facilities, or in locations where demand for year-around use prevails, will operate continuously.

U-M Book Shows Historical Papers

A look back through maps, letters, books and documents that highlight more than 300 years of Michigan history is provided in the latest bulletin of the Clements Library of the University of Michigan. Forty-eight of the most interesting items in the library's original Michigan materials are reproduced in the booklet "One Hundred Michigan Rarities". The other fifty-two rare items are listed in chronological order with short explanatory notes.

Sections of the bulletin are devoted to periods when the state was owned by France, Great Britain and the United States.

Among the 17th century French maps which are reproduced, in the booklet "One Hundred Michigan Rarities", is the map of the state of Michigan probably appears for the first time.

Several letters written during Pontiac's siege of Detroit in 1763 are among the reproductions, including one by the old chief himself ending the incident.

The final page of the Treaty of Ghent, which ended the War of 1812, is pictured with the signatures and seals of all the commissioners; among them John Quincy Adams, Henry Clay and Albert Gallatin. This is one of three official copies in existence.

One fine in the bulletin shows Lincoln's first draft call in Michigan in 1862.

Pages from several books published during the early periods and important historically are part of the bulletin. A "History of Canada" published in French in 1636 mentions early explorations in the Upper Peninsula. Books of adventure and poetry on the Michigan frontier are included. The title page of the state's first constitution of 1835 is reproduced.

The introduction to the bulletin links it with the Michigan Memorial Phoenix Project, which is exploring the impact of the atomic age. The library can help in our understanding the past from which the new age is arising. The American past is quite fully documented in the Clements Library, the introduction states.

By adopting better strains of chickens, by keeping more pullets in the laying flocks, and by better feeding and sanitation, they now manage to get over a third more eggs per hen than they did twenty years ago. U. S. D. A. economists expect these improvements to continue through the next ten years.

Along with this, the number of chickens and eggs needed will increase as our population grows.

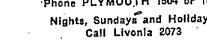

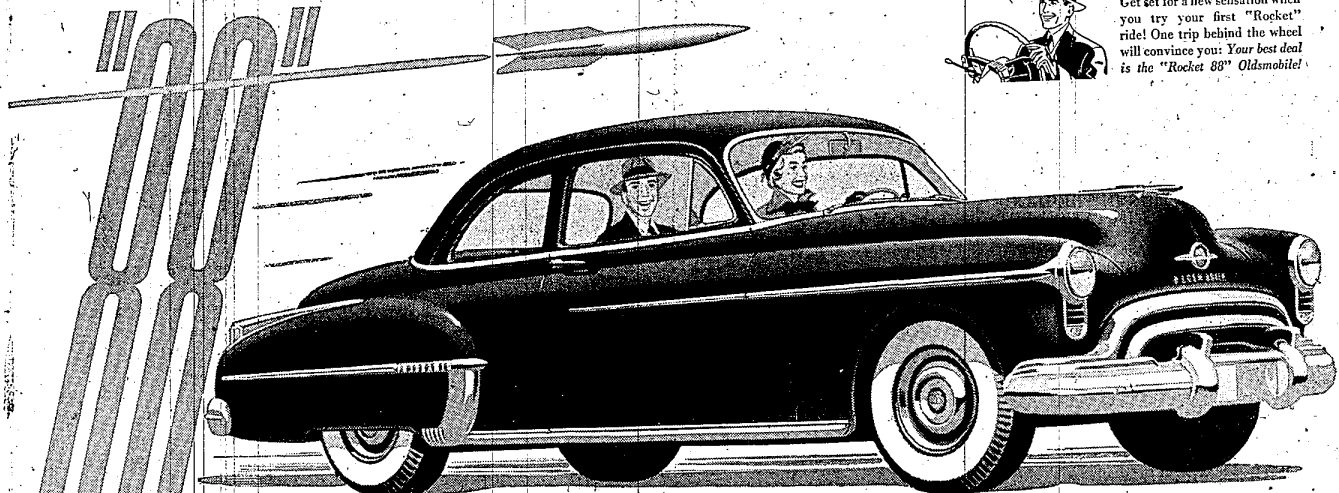

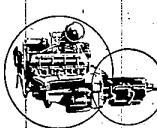
