revisions. The third election will determine whether or not the revisions will be accepted.

Committee chairman Ernest Hickman told the group that the question of a charter revision is a serious one that will materially effect the taxpayers in this city for years to come. To do what we have determined to do will take a lot of workers, a lot of time and a lot of hard work.

The committee decided Friday night to bolster its ranks by obtaining two members from each city organization, and to ask for volunteers from the public at large. Committee members said this would be "a good opportunity for the people in the town who have expressed interest in the present system to get out and do something about it."

Hickman stated residents who desired to take part in the campaign could call him at his office, Farmington 3000 for current information.

The speaker, a member of the department of political science staff at the University of Michigan, assisted with formation of the group. He stated that other cities had found the city manager plan superior to the commission system which Farmington has at present.

While the commission plan sounds simple, it has been found to have most of the defects of a weak mayor system, and others peculiar to itself. "Government under this form tends to be easily manipulated, does not provide successfully for competent department heads or other personnel, lacks a single unifying responsible executive, provides no adequate check on government spending, and is so conducive to buck passing that although the voter makes many choices at the polls, he does not know whom to blame for bad government or to praise for good government."

"The chief fault of the commission form is that it makes no organizational distinction between the executive and the administrative function. This is not only unworkable from the practical point of view, but it is also contrary to the traditional tradition, which from the beginning distinguished between the executive and legislative branches of government and attempted to keep them separate."

Tableman said the city manager system, under which only a council is elected at large and in turn appoints the city manager who hires and fires other administrative employees, has been adopted by nearly 1,000 cities and abandoned by only 35. Largest city under city manager government is Cincinnati, population 455,000 and the smallest is Tebetoro, New Jersey having a population of 40.

He served on the Farmington City Commission continuously for 12 years until his resignation August 11, 1949. During his period on the Commission he served as finance and budget advisor as well as Mayor Pro-Tem for a number of years. He was a resident of Farmington for about 14 years.

Mr. Bagnall is survived by his wife, Georgian, two daughters, Mrs. Kurt Brammer, Farmington, and Mrs. Leonard Hamlin, Boyce, and a brother, George E. of Birmingham. He is also survived by a grandson and twin granddaughters.

nearly 500 members worshipping in the church that stands at the corner of Grand River and Warner Avenues.

These pioneers struggled heroically and sacrificially to provide for the spiritual needs of the early settlers. For many years they were handicapped for want of a building, and worshipped in private homes, in school houses when they were built, and at one time, in the cooper-shop of citizen Joel Boswick on Shawanawee Avenue; where the Rev. C. D. Stokes used the cooper's block for a pulpit.

It was not until 1840 that a church was started on a lot at the corner of Shawanawee and Warner, overlooking our valley. It was a heart-breaking job, which for want of funds, was not completed until 1844. In 1920 a fire of unknown origin destroyed this old church, which at the time was the oldest Methodist church in Michigan. In the course of an hour all that was visible of a lifetime of work and sacrifice on the part of Farmington's pioneer Methodists was swept away.

The Rev. Sidney D. Eva was the pastor at the time, and he led his congregation in laying plans for the present edifice which was completed in 1922 and dedicated by the late Bishop Theodore S. Henderson. Since the feather has caused serious shifting of masonry in the upper part of the structure. This is now being remedied. Much use has made it necessary to decorate a large part of the interior and to replace the floors in the basement rooms.

The Board of Trustees is confident of the success of the Crusade to raise sufficient funds to complete these improvements and invites all the friends of the church to the Loyalty service on Sunday, October 22, at 11:15 a.m.

POST OFFICE ADDS EXTENSION TO MAIL ROUTES

Norman C. Lee, Farmington Postmaster, announced this week that the Post Office has been authorized an extension of the Mounted City Route.

The extension includes a section of the township just north of Ten Mile Road, and east of Orchard Lake Road. Lee stated that such a service is called a mounted city route because the mail is carried by vehicle and left at boxes in front of the residences.

Three streets are involved in the extension. They include Springbrook Drive, Westmoreland and Harcourt. Lee added that approximately 35 families are involved on the three streets. He pointed out that there is considerable building in the area with more families moving in continually. Prior to the extension, residents had to pick up their mail at boxes located considerable distances from their homes.

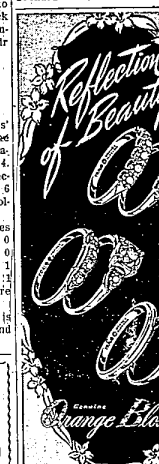
