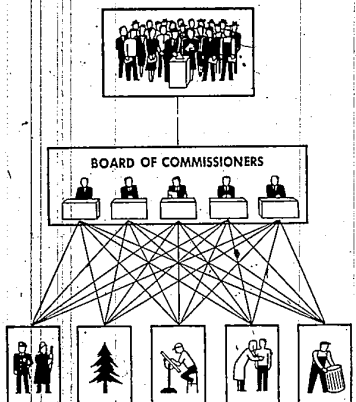
Novi Baptist Church Holds Family Night

New Plan May Be Tried If Voters Decide To Revise Charter Nov. 7



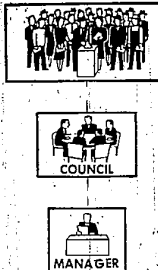
Above is a schematic diagram similar to Farmington's present form of municipal government. A City Commission, composed of six commissioners and a mayor is elected, with each commissioner the head of a city department. In addition to the commissioners, voters also elect a city clerk, treasurer, and assessor. Both legislative and administrative powers are held by the commission.
