Cold Weather Calls For Stabling Cows

Few dairy farmers look forward to the time they must start keeping cows in the barn. But J. G. Hays, Michigan State College extension dairyman, says the wise cow man is now opening up his "bovine ho" for at least night lodging.

Cold, damp ground, he says, is a great aid to the evergreen bacteria that cause mastitis. A chilled udder cannot resist the invaders.

Hays points out that Michigan weather is "whimsical" now. The evenings may start balmy, but frost may come by morning—or a cold rain may set in.

The dairyman believes that the changeable fall weather presents a real problem even when the cows are kept in the barn. Drafts are always there to cause trouble. Hays cites research showing that when doors or windows were left open when the weather was muggy, cows in drafts came down with udder troubles. These troubles largely disappeared when the barn openings were closed and ventilation was afforded by an electrically operated system.

If you have no ventilating equipment in the barn, Hays advises opening only doors and windows where the wind "blow directly on the cows." "It's easier to prevent mastitis than to cure it," he concludes.

FALL CONTROL HELPS CUT FIELD MOUSE DAMAGE IN ORCHARD

Langer says the way to check the much of the rodent damage is to clear away all the grass and sod around the tree trunks for a distance of two feet. After this is done, the cleared area should be filled with gravel, cinder, or lake sand. The material should be banked slightly up to the tree trunk.

Poison baits are also recommended by Langer. Three materials can be used. Meadow mice and pine mice can be checked by a granular phosphide bait. So birds and animals will not feed on the bait, cracked corn should be dyed with a green vegetable dye before the poison is added.

Two-inch apples cut into 10 to 12 pieces, shaped as orange slices, can also be treated with zinc phosphide for bait. Because zinc phosphide is poisonous, directions should be secured from county agricultural agents for safe use. During the mixing process, rubber gloves should be worn, Langer warned. The mixing should be done outdoors.

"Another effective control is strychnine-treated oats placed in a runaway under a foot of straw or hay to catch them. As a caution, Langer said that all dropped fruit under a tree should be picked up before poison of any kind is applied.

Homegrown lumber should be stacked on a well-drained site and exposed to the wind, say Michigan State College foresters. A strong foundation is important. Concrete piers are best, but wooden ones can be made by sinking posts into the ground.

MSC Adds To Staff To Stress Fruit

Harvesting, handling, and storage of fruits will receive increased emphasis in the research program of Michigan State College with the addition of Dr. W. W. Aldrich to the staff of the horticulture department.

A graduate of John Hopkins University in chemical engineering, Dr. Aldrich took his advanced study at the University of Maryland, specializing in horticulture.

He served with the U. S. Department in Washington, D. C. with the U. S. D. A. in charge of deodorant fruit research for the entire United States. He also completed four years in commercial work before coming to Michigan State College.

Dr. Aldrich's appointment to the research and teaching staff is in response to fruit growers' interest in many problems concerning harvesting, handling, and storage of Michigan fruit. Work in these fields will be expanded in the future and several projects begun by Dr. Aldrich have important needs that must be filled before they can accumulate the cash. Explains Family Use Of Credit

Whether or not to use installment credit is one of the issues home-makers face today. Some families buy only for cash. Credit is not a problem for them. It is the borderline use of credit that families should question today — if only for years of long-term credit on inflation, advises Irma H. Gross, head of the department of home management and child development at Michigan State College. Inflation occurs when there is an increased amount of money available with which to buy the same amount or a smaller amount of goods. It is really inflation that forces the price of an article up by bidding against each other.

The new installment credit regulations put in effect recently may help borderline users of credit to decide not to use it. In general it increases the minimum size of down payment and decreases the length of time allowed for payment of the outstanding debt.

The borderline user of credit may well recognize that he is aiding inflation and to refrain from using it is doing a part in holding back inflation.

Homemakers today are very much concerned whether they will be able to buy what they need for their families now or later. As responsible citizens of a free country they are concerned as to what effect their present buying may have on the national economy.

FIRST HEIFERS A GOOD CHOICE FOR REPLACEMENTS

First calf heifers should be used as dairy herd replacements because they are less likely to be infected with mastitis, according to Dr. J. Killham, extension veterinarian at Michigan State College.

Heifers are the best bet because they have been exposed much to udder harming conditions.

Treat infections in cows are primarily caused by improper stabling and the lack of good bedding, Killham relates. To guard against this the stalls should be wide enough and long enough for cows to lie down and get up without injuring their teats and udders.

DISCUSSION FOLDER MAKES COMPARISON IN FARM INCOMES

Arthur Mauch, Michigan State college Agricultural economist, says some seemingly contradictory statements can be made about the farmer. For example:

Farm people, making up roughly 20 per cent of total U. S. population, receive about 10 per cent of our national income, near nearly half of nation's children.

In 1948 the average per capita net income of farm people was \$307, compared with a non-farm average of \$1,569.

Farmers have just enjoyed the most prosperous 10 years in the history of American agriculture. Some have had extremely high incomes — others extremely low.

These statements are among those to be considered by Michigan farmers in the first of the discussion pamphlets issued this fall by the Michigan State College Cooperative Extension Service. These discussion meetings, held by farm groups, were inaugurated two years ago to help inform rural people on agricultural policy.

"Income Livestock, Government Aid — How Does the Farmer Rate?" is the subject of this first discussion pamphlet which is available to rural or city groups through local county agricultural agents in each Michigan county.
