With the cooperation of the Clareville Parent Teachers Association, the Wayne County Health Department and PTA members have planned a Child Health Center for the Clareville area. The center will start a monthly conference beginning at 1 p.m. November 9 at the Clareville High School.

The objective of the center is to educate parents in better methods of child care and to provide continuing health supervision for children from birth to school age, according to Mrs. George Griffin, Sr.

Any mother in the area who cannot financially provide medical supervision and protective immunization against diphtheria, whooping cough, and small pox for her children from three months to five years may attend.

Children will be seen by appointment, obtainable by calling Mrs. Thelma Wagner at Farmington 0223-M.

Mrs. Margaret Bradley is chairman of the conference center committee. Mrs. George Griffin, Jr., is chairman of the transportation committee, and may be reached by telephoning Farmington 0781-W.

Mrs. Helen Newcomb is chairman of a group of nine women who will assist at the center by weighing and measuring the babies, making appointments, and keeping the children entertained while waiting to be seen by the pediatrician.
