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Starlet Explains Make-Up Magic

GIRLS who compare their own slapped-together looking make-up with the smooth, finished appearance of movie stars often wonder what tricks they use to achieve this perfection.

Ruth Roman, well-known film actress, reveals a few of her dressing-table secrets in these tips on applying cosmetics.

For that "portrait look," she borrows a painter's technique, brushing on her make-up.

To apply rouge in this way, she touches the bristles of a soft brush to a cake of the shade best suited to her complexion and costume, and then gently strokes her cheeks with the brush until the color is well-blended.

In the same way, she applies dry powder, using another soft brush reserved for just that purpose. Care should be taken, she warns, to avoid caking powder in your hair-line.

After applying lipstick, she finishes her make-up job by patting her face all over with a cold, damp sponge. She prepares the sponge for this fresh-up task by dipping it in ice water and then squeezing it well to eliminate extra moisture.

A small bowl of water is standard dressing-table equipment for Ruth. She finds it particularly useful when she is applying eye make-up. A small, slightly-moistened cotton swab is excellent, she finds, for removing smudges of mascara.

Gives Buying Tips For New Washers

Will your new washing machine be the automatic or the conventional type?

This will depend upon what you need — the amount of laundry you have to do, other demands on your time and your pocketbook. Take your time in choosing one and be sure you buy the right kind for your needs. This is the advice of Lucile Ketchum, extension home manager, specialist at Michigan State College. She adds this comment:

An automatic can take the drudgery out of washday and lets you do other jobs while it does the washing. "This may make it worth the cost to you, and it may cost more than twice as much as a good conventional type washer."

You must have an ample supply of water, both hot and cold, for an automatic to work satisfactorily in your home. You must also have adequate water pressure. Ask about the requirements for hot and cold water and water pressure and examine different kinds of automatic washers.

Check on installation costs, too, for they may add considerably to the cost of the washer. If you can have your washer bolted down, you may want to consider the bolt-down type which is less expensive than the models which don't have to be bolted to the floor.

If you choose a conventional type washer, will it have a wringer or a spinner? The spinner is to be desired from the standpoint of safety and it is less damaging to clothes. Most machines of this type have a separate spinner tub so that the wet clothes must be lifted by hand from the washer to the spinner. A riser helps to lift the clothes. With a wringer and safety release is very important and should be easy to reach and to operate.

Good Ventilation Needed For Spuds

Well-ventilated potato storage will minimize losses from late blight and other soft rot, Michigan State College agricultural authorities advised this week.

One thousand bushels of potatoes put in storage at 52 degrees and cooled to 44 degrees in one month will give off about 75 gallons of water, they say. Electric fan forced ventilation is recommended, especially when air space is limited between the top of the potato pile and the warehouse ceiling.
