

HUNTERS HELP RESEARCH WITH GAME FEATHERS

Hunters can help in the research battle to unravel some of the mysteries of game cycles.

The conservation department asks hunters to send in grouse wing and tail feathers and pheasant wing and leg feathers from birds shot this fall.

Special franked envelopes for mailing in specimens can be obtained from the local conservation officer, district game manager, conservation department field offices, and from some of the Michigan United Conservation clubs.

Both grouse wings should be cut or broken off at the "band" or "waist." Four middle tail feathers should be included. On the sharp tail the narrow middle pair of feathers is required and on the prairie chicken the four middle and two outer tail feathers are requested.

SELECT MACMULLEN FOR HOUGHTON LAKE WILDLIFE STATION

Selection of Ralph A. McMullen as head of the proposed Houghton Lake wildlife experiment station is announced by Harry D. Ruhl, conservation department game chief.

Temporary headquarters will be set up at the lake until an office and laboratory can be constructed. Selection of a permanent site and construction of the building is expected soon.

Several research projects already underway will be handled through the new station. These are deer orchard and farm damage at Traverse City, biologist in charge research at Gladwin wildlife refuge, biologist Walter Palmer in charge; and other deer investigation work including recent fly planting projects by biologist Elsworth Harger.

MacMullen, 33, previously was part and full time pheasant research specialist for the department's game division at Lansing. He is a native of Garden City and a graduate of Dearborn High School and the University of Michigan. He has recently completed work for his doctor's degree in wildlife management from Michigan State College.

During World War II, MacMullen served as a pilot with the Antilles Air Command. He was discharged with rank of major.

Creation of a wildlife research station for the northern lower peninsula provides the department with four stations. Construction now is in progress to expand the Schooner's Cusmo station in upper peninsula. Cusmo station is being used on some of the work. The southern Michigan stations are located at Rose Lake near Lansing and at Swan Creek near Allegan.

Farmers own two and a half million trucks, and another half million trucks haul only farm products.

Bounty Payments Double In September

Number of coyotes, bobcats and foxes bountied in September more than doubled according to the conservation department.

Payments on 1,043 foxes, 555 coyotes, 183 bobcats and six wolves totaled \$15,110. The state paid \$10,040 in August bounties on 1,016 foxes, 382 coyotes, 77 bobcats and three wolves.

Five of the wolves taken in September were caught in Iron county.
