Demand For Maps Exhausts Supply

Large demand for the conservation department's new 83-county map set has exhausted the supply. Complete sets in book form will be again available in the near future.

This is the first year detailed maps of all 83 counties have been available, from the department's lands division. Over 100 different features are identified in many counties, some of which are not shown on regular maps.

Reasonable Request for individual county maps are supplied free but there is a \$2.50 charge for the complete set of 83 maps in book form.

Individual maps but not books can be obtained from department regional offices at Jackson, Rosebush and Marquette as well as at Detroit.

New MSC Chapel Is Officially Named

Alumni Memorial Chapel is the official name selected for Michigan State College's all-faith chapel, being built to honor Spartan alumni killed in all United States wars. The name was chosen by the alumni advisory council at a Homecoming meeting October 15. Work on the chapel, financed by alumni contributions of \$175,000, started last week and it is hoped that the structure will be completed by late spring.
