Coeds Invade Police Course
For the first time in its history, the Michigan State Police department of police administration has opened its doors to women.

A new four-year course in crime prevention has been established which will permit the entrance of women into the department of police administration. Prof. Arthur Bransdatter, head of the department, said.

Although it allows coeds to study police work at MSC for the first time, the course is not designed specifically for women, and an equal number of men and women is expected to enroll.

In the planning stage since 1948, the program was established to fill a growing demand for trained personnel, particularly women, in the field of crime prevention.

"The course combines psychology, traffic, law, detection, forensics, juvenile justice and prison work," according to Robert H. Scott, associate director of police administration and designer of the course.

"Graduates of the course will be concerned with the positive action of police in preventing crime at its source, and preventing children and youth from the tragedy of criminal careers that destroy themselves and society," he added.

A bachelor of science degree from MSC in police administration will be granted following 11 terms of academic study and two terms of practical training with Michigan law enforcement agencies.

CONSERVATION DEPT. WINS SUIT FOR PIKE GROUNDS

In the first Michigan case of its type, Circuit Judge John C. Stauffer has approved a consent decree whereby north shore Otsego lake property owners will allow culverts to permit the flow of water and passage of fish into the important spawning grounds.

Agreement was reached between the conservation department and property owners Mabel Fowler and George and Mary Hoffman to prevent destruction of the lake pike "factory" and yet allow cottage development in the area.

Culvert installations under two of the private roads recently built are to be finished before the spring spawning season, reports N. V. Olds, department attorney.

There will be no further filling in the area known as a government lot one in Bagley Township, below the contour elevation of 1,572.5 feet above sea level.

The conservation department's Institute for fisheries research pointed out last summer that the irregular north shore marsh area is pike spawning territory and preservation is vital to future Otsego lake pike fishing.
