

**Dairying Vital To 80% Of Farms**

Investment in dairy farming in Michigan amounts to more than two and a third billion dollars, Dr. Earl Weaver, head of the Michigan State College dairy department reported this week. This, he cited, was greater than many of the large auto manufacturing corporations in the state.

In pointing to the size of the dairy industry, Weaver said 80 percent of Michigan's farmers depend on dairying for a part of their income. He added that one out of every 6 persons in the state depends on dairying for a part or all of his income when equipment manufacturing, dairy plants, distributors and others are included.

**MSC Service Staff Gets 40-Hour Week**

A 40-hour week with no reduction in gross pay went into effect in November for most operations and maintenance employees at Michigan State College.

Clerical and salaried employees of MSC have been on a 40-hour week for some time, officials said, but operation and maintenance employees have been working 40 to 44 hours per week.

This measure follows by two months a moderate pay increase for all labor, service and clerical employees. Both actions were taken in order to meet in some measure the competition of business and industry, according to L. H. Glander, personnel director.


**Band Performs At Briggs Stadium**
