PRINCIPAL HARRISON INTERVIEWS GRADS ATTENDING U. OF M.

At the Annual Principal-Student Conference in Ann Arbor November 8, eight Farmington High graduates, now students at the University of Michigan, suggested that good note-taking, composition writing, and outlining be particularly emphasized in high school courses.

These eight graduates, Jack Boyce, Wales Martindale, Ann Plumton, Donna Bryan, Corinne Gardner, Dick Schreiber, Tom Sechler and Bruce Trueman, were interviewed by Mr. G. V. Harrison, principal at Farmington High. Tape recordings of these interviews were made and brought back to Farmington. The Journalism class heard the reports.

Next to good note-taking, the most important point stressed by the eight freshmen was the study habits. Jack Boyce said, "I study at least from five to seven hours a day outside of class."

Tom Sechler and Dick Schreiber was a suggestion of Ann Plumton in the habit of studying hard now for "you will certainly have to if you go to college."

Wales Martindale and Bruce Trueman, first college writing quite hard. They suggested that high school students be required to write more themes.

More essay questions on tests was a suggestion of Ann Plumton. Ann also highly recommends English IV to students who plan to attend college.

Donna Bryan and Corinne Gardner, who are taking courses in preparation for nursing, said that Farmington prepares its students for college as well as that any other high school. Donna said that competition for prospective nurses was very high at Michigan and that although high school preparation is important, most of the work is up to the individual.

Corinne advised those girls who plan to take nursing to get all the high school science they can. The most important thing she said was, "Make very sure you really want to be a nurse."

The purposes of these conferences were explained by Mr. Harrison:

1. An opportunity for the students to talk over personal and academic problems.
2. Reports of those conferences help other high school students who are preparing for college.
3. They benefit the University by giving them ideas on how to counsel Freshmen.
