with estimated enrollment placed between 3,865 and 4,282 by 1956.

Members of the Board indicated a desire to have both a junior and senior high school building. They also indicated that a new site for a senior high school would be sought. The Board stated that they were not prepared at this time to make any suggestions for a site and that these details would have to be worked out at later meetings.

Dunkel stated that the District should have a vote on the retention of a bond issue late this winter and the building program should be started by spring. He added that the District is in excellent condition as far as the clearing up of the present outstanding bond issues are concerned. There is a total outstanding in bonds of \$358,000. On June 30, 1950, there was on hand a total of \$13,083 to meet the 1939 and 1945 refunding obligations. A continuance of the 2 mill levy in 1951 and approximately 3/4 mill in 1952 will provide sufficient funds to meet the refunding obligations as to principal payments. For payments on the 1948 bond issue there was a balance of \$44,191 on hand as of June 30, 1950. It is estimated that a tax levy of only 6.5 mills will be necessary in 1951 to meet all remaining payments, including interest, on this bond issue.

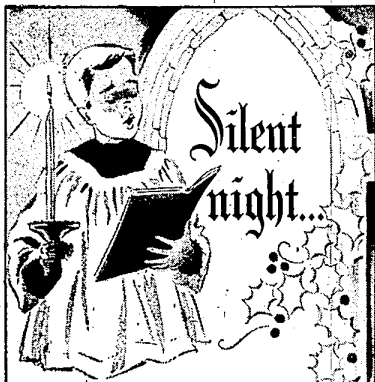

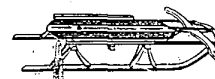
