Ship 1951 Fishing Licenses To Dealers

Over a million and a half 1951 fishing licenses should be in the hands of 2,500 license agents not later than December 21, the conservation department advises.

Shipments were started earlier this year to reduce mailing congestion during the Christmas rush.

The department reminds fishermen that the new licenses are needed starting January 1. The resident angler will continue to pay \$1.50 and the non-resident \$3 for the annual permit and \$2 for the temporary one.

In the fish lake digest that goes with each license, the few regulation changes from the previous year are set in boldface or italic type, so the angler may find them easily.

The 1951 license printing order was for 1,200,000 resident licenses, 230,000 annual non-resident and 200,000 of the 10-day licenses. This is the first time more annual non-resident permits have been printed than the temporary type.

Boys and girls had their annual Christmas grab bag party in the Neighborhood Church Friday evening.

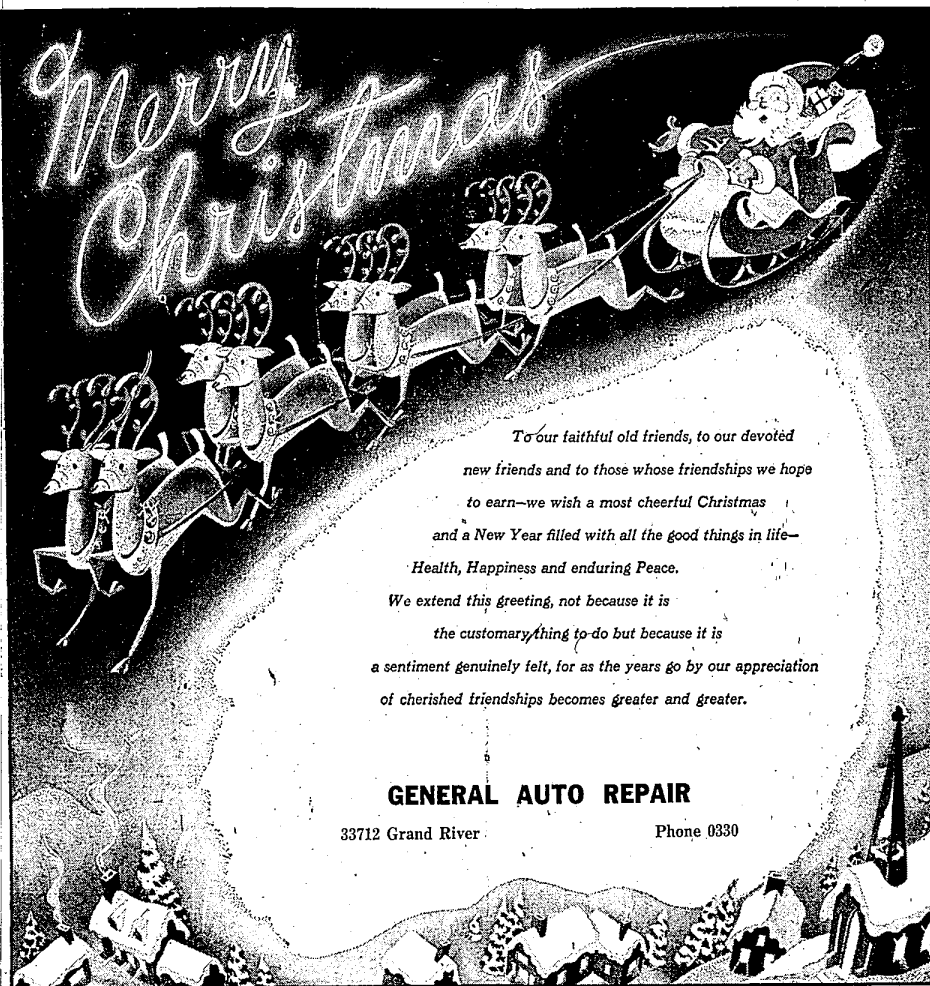
