

Ask No Deferment For Conservation Men

No military draft deferments will be asked for conservation personnel, the state conservation department announces.

Under present draft regulations, this policy will not drain away key personnel difficult or impossible to replace. At present the department has nearly 1,700 full, part time and seasonal employees and expects to lose 10 to 15 per cent of them to the services. Thirty men already have been granted military leave of absence.

In the World War II period, 252 department employees served in the armed forces, seven making the supreme sacrifice. Department field forces, mainly forest firemen,

conservation officers and park rangers, entered the services in largest numbers.




