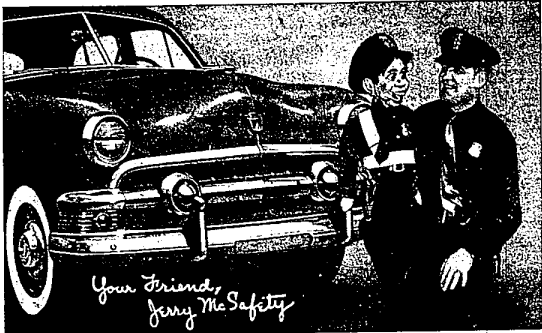


Jerry McSafety To Visit Farmington School Friday
