### WHAT IS BROTHERHOOD?

This community, along with many others in the United States, is celebrating National Brotherhood Week. Brotherhood is like a new phase of science. It offers a wide field for discovery; yet it is even at attempt to begin to uncover its wonders.

We usually think of unbrotherliness as discrimination between races and creeds. True, this is a big barrier against the brotherhood of man, but there are many other barriers just as big which we put up almost daily, probably without realizing it.

As an example, it is often the case that we avoid or care little to talk with people who are not dressed quite as well as we are. To illustrate, a bus situation might be used. "It's an expensively dressed person, steps on a bus and discovers only one vacant seat. 'X', a simply dressed person, is sitting in the adjacent seat. 'Y' takes a quick glance and decides rather to stand than sit with 'X'. Surely this is not brotherhood in action.

This may seem an insignificant matter; yet this is just the kind of barrier to the fulfillment of the concept of brotherhood as racial discrimination. If we would more often place ourselves in the position of others, and actually treat others as we would like to be treated, then brotherhood would be closer to reality. And our nation needs this reality!"
