

Baptist Church Holds Missionary Rally

Miss Ruth Daniels, member of the Women's American Baptist Foreign Society, American Baptist Conference, will be guest speaker March 27 when a missionary rally is conducted at Farmington's Baptist Church at 8 p.m.

Miss Daniels has been stationed at Ypsilanti Normal College and Hillsdale College, and did graduate work at Columbia University teachers college, New York. She and Miss Elsie Bernard, Farmington High School teacher, were stationed together in India at one time. Special music will be rendered at the rally by the Farmington choir.

SCARCE MATERIALS, HIGH WATER DELAY NEW CITY PIPELINE

Material shortages and high ground water levels will probably delay construction of the new eight inch water main to the Floral Park area, city commissioner Roy Miller revealed Tuesday. The city water commissioner stated that about four-fifths of the material for the line had been purchased by the city, but contractors advise against the laying of the asbestos cement pipeline until sometime in late April or May.

Actual construction of the line is contingent upon arrival of the rest of the east-riven fittings needed for the job as well as the condition of the earth. Test holes will be made to determine the height of the ground water before the job is started. "Municipalities, unlike defense plants, have no priority to obtain scarce metal fittings," Miller said. "They probably won't arrive before the ground dries out."

city Board place a temporary dog quarantine on the township in order to cut down the possibility of rabies. He stated that the township has the authority to place a temporary quarantine with final approval going through the county and state. Ballou added that through this procedure all strays could be picked up and held for claiming. Thus the unclaimed dogs could be located and destroyed. Ballou stated that some action will have to be taken to cut down the large number of stray dogs running loose in the township. The Board stated that they would check with the county on the proper procedure to follow in establishing the quarantine.

A letter from Fred Wilkinson, Democratic chairman, was read before the Board, calling attention to the unequal representation of Republicans and Democrats on the Township Election Boards. He called attention to the law which requires representation by both parties on the Board. Harry McCracken, Township Clerk, stated that every effort has been made to secure equal representation of both parties. He added, however, that it is extremely difficult to get members of the election board to commit themselves on their party affiliation. McCracken also stated that he has on numerous occasions contacted Wilkinson for suggestions as to board members and has followed his suggestions.

representative from the City of Farmington. The commission also approved the expenditure of \$10 for the purchase of supplies for the sub-committee. Each governmental unit represented is being asked to assist.

CIVIL DEFENSE

Mayor Hamlin stated that Victor Blakeslee, Farmington Civil Defense Director, attended a special meeting of directors in Pontiac last week and preliminary plans are now being made to organize the defense program. Hamlin stated that the complete organization is expected to be ready for approval by the Commission at the April meeting. Kenn Loomis, police and fire Commissioner, stated that Harrison Johnson, member of the Farmington fire department, attended a defense meeting in Detroit Monday on fire protection in case of emergency.

The commission authorized the printing and mailing of warning notices to city residents regarding the burning of grass or brush in the open. Any person found guilty of starting such a fire which causes damage to property or causes the fire department to make a run is subject to a fine of \$100.
