Coach Robert Selke's Trojans ended their current season with a not too impressive record of four wins and 12 losses.

The Trojans collected three of their wins from South Lyon and one from Fitzgerald while losing twice to Milford, Northville, Clarkston, Inkster, Roosevelt, Bentley and once each to St. Alphonsus and Fitzgerald.

Captain Robert Godette piled up 191 of the Trojans' 453 points, scoring 611 points for their season.

The rest of the season for the Trojans was done by John Faler 79, Bill Robbins 58, Joe Whyte 55, Elmer Rousseau 52, Russell Robitaille 46, Jerry Albers 39, Ed Chappel 6 and Wally Christensen 2.

Joe Whyte is holding top honors as "Bad Boy" of the season, collecting 55 fouls, followed by his buddy Jerry Albers with 45.

The two closest games of the season for the Trojans were with Northville and Clarkston. The Trojans lost both games in overtime periods. At the Northville game the score was tied at 35-35. Starting in the three minutes overtime period, Northville managed to score two points to win 37-35. The Inkster - Roosevelt game went into overtime with the score 40-40. Russell Robitaille scored one basket to bring the score to 41-40. But Inkster - Roosevelt followed with two quick baskets to win 44-42.

The Trojans accepted their worst defeat from a strong Milford team with the score of 62-26.

Despite their many losses, the Trojans came back with fine spirit to win the first game of the District 25 tournament against South Lyon 33-25. In the second game they met St. Alphonsus, a larger team, but evenly matched in skill. But the height went out to the score of 26-32. 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RETURNING BIRDS
ARE ADDING COLOR,
SONGS TO MICHIGAN

Not only are the usual spring migratory birds arriving in Michigan to add new color and song to the landscape, but some birds are already nesting.

George M. Sutton, associate professor of zoology at the University of Michigan, has received reports on two nests of the great horned owl. He also says the prairie-horned lark has established nests since it is the earliest of nesting passerines (sparrow-like birds).

The prairie-horned lark sometimes nests while the snow is still on the ground and often has to go through a hole in the snow to reach its lowlying nest, he reports. Each week now will bring more birds back to Michigan from their winter homes. Among those due now, Professor Sutton says, are the fox sparrow, the hermit thrush, Canada geese and various wild ducks, including mergansers. The ducks arrive each year as soon as the ice disappears from the rivers and inland lakes.

The yellow-bellied sapsucker, a woodpecker with a large white patch on its wings, is also due now. Lois Rozenboom reports. This bird may be observed to hitch down birds two or three times after it has alighted on the tree. Woodpecks should be heard from the bird may be heard in the late twilight, singing in its upward flight from the ground. It nests very early.

Likewise due to arrive soon is the song sparrow, which will be singing as soon as it comes. Other early migrants are the ruby-crowned kinglet, the myrtle warbler (the latter bird sometimes stays here during the winter), the cowbird, red-winged blackbird, grackle, bittern, and the great blue heron.

Robins, returning now in numbers, sometimes nest in Michigan, depending perhaps on local food supply. Professor Sutton says are both close to Ann Arbor. One was in a woods about 50 miles to the north and the other was in the Edwin S. George Reserve, a University property near Pinckney.

The great horned owl, which remains in Michigan throughout the winter, takes over the nest of other birds, usually that of the red-tailed hawk or crow. Occasionally it will occupy a squirrel's nest, he reports.

One of the nests was found late in February by Kay T. Rogers, instructor in anatomy at the University, and David Parmelee, a graduate student from Iron Mountain. They are keeping track of the nest to find out when the mother owl will lay her two eggs and the length of the incubation period.

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
