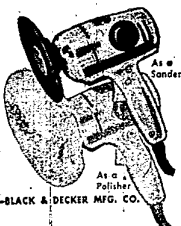

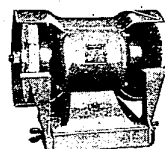

Students, Teachers Exchange Views
On Characteristics Of Ideal Person

"What is the ideal student?" "What is the ideal teacher?" Five Farmington High students and teachers were asked to give their views on these questions.

Here are their opinions: Mrs. Geraldine Brock, speech teacher — "My ideal student is one who contributes to class discussions, yet listens attentively when others are speaking... one who is cooperative, considerate, and does his very best work at all times."

Mr. Tarmo Maattala, social studies teacher — "The qualities desirable in an ideal student are the desire to improve himself, to have

a feeling of pride in his school, and to develop community citizenship... to have pride in being a part of, and improving his own community."

Miss Virginia Carley, English teacher — "... one who is considerate of others, democratic, dependable, pleasant, enthusiastic, honest, original... one who works for the betterment of the class and school. He is a thinking person."

Mr. Dennis McCarthy, social studies teacher — "The student with an open mind who has a keen appreciation of the world and all the people in it, these make an ideal student. He should have an understanding of what it means to be a citizen of a democracy, and should be able to look upon all people as individuals, not as groups."

Mrs. Alice Fernandez, Spanish teacher — "The ideal student is one who possesses an inspiring mind and is eager to learn. He gives wholehearted cooperation to teachers and other students in class... always does his best."

What is your ideal teacher? Rita Christensen, junior — "In my opinion, an ideal teacher is one who has the capacity to correct mistakes made by students in a smooth manner without ridiculing the student or laughing at him. He should act like any other individual and not place himself above students."

Margot Hunt, senior — "The ideal teacher would be one who understands and cooperative. He or she would have to love their work and strive to create a closer unity between the pupils and the teacher."

Jim Keck, senior — "An ideal teacher is one who would adapt to the ways of the students to some extent instead of the students adapting to the teacher. He should know enough about psychology to vary class procedures... make students feel free to say what they think... make good use of audio-visual aids, not only to teach but as relief from boredom."

JoAnne DeNies, sophomore — "My idea of an ideal teacher is one who possesses humor but can be stern and has a wide background so that he or she can take part in any type of discussion."

Nancy Isley, senior — "... an educator who is broad-minded and teaches no prejudice."

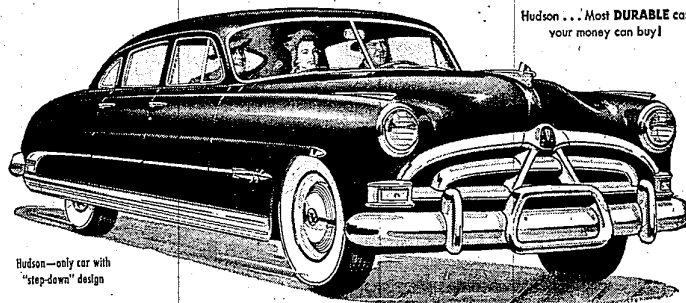
