

Pan Fishermen Must Go North Of Highway M-46

With few exceptions, the conservation department says southern Michigan pan fishermen will have to transfer angling operations north of highway M-46 until June 25.

Throughout the state the bluegill and sunfish season has ended, except for experimentally classified Devils Lake in Lenawee county and Hess Lake, Newaygo county. But there is no closed season above highway M-46 on yellow perch, crappies, whitefish, rock and warmouth bass, and a number of lesser species listed in the angler's fish law digest. Too, there is no closed season on these fish in non-trout streams in any part of the state nor on Great Lakes, including Lake St. Clair, and the connecting waters, St. Marys, St. Clair and Detroit rivers.

Trout season opens April 23 this year.
