Fertilizer Adds To Sudan Yields

Lots of good forage is the goal of many farmers this summer and it can be added through fertilization, says James A. Porter, Michigan State College soil scientist.

A profitable increase in forage production will result from heavy fertilization of Sudan grass planted right after corn planting, he states. If possible, the field should be manured heavily before plowing. Otherwise, apply a 10-6-4 or 8-8-8 commercial fertilizer at 350 pounds per acre at planting time.

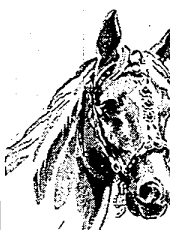
If a legume seedling is to be made in the Sudan, the 8-8-8 analysis is preferable.

Productive Sudan cases the grazing load on alfalfa and alfalfa brome in the late summer and early fall, Porter advises. That is the time when alfalfa must build up food reserves to carry it through the winter and give good growth the following spring.

Red canary grass should be fertilized when planted and every second year with 9-2-7 fertilizer at 300 pounds per acre.

Mrs. Byron Randle of Valleyview was at the Bush home on Monday to instruct Mrs. Bush in handicraft work.

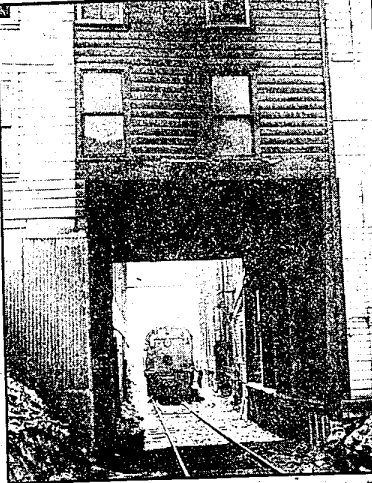

Prepare Parks For '51 Picnic Season

Preparations for another 11,000, 000 or more picnickers and other visitors at Michigan's 60 state parks and recreation areas are well under way except at more northern locations.

Likening winter conditions are delaying conservation department facilitating operations in most northern lower and upper peninsula parks.

"Loss of rangers to the military draft and a food shortage are causing some difficulties," says L. N. Jones, assistant state parks chief.

Park rangers are busy cleaning grounds, fixing picnic tables and stoves, building a few new tables, repairing trees and underbrush, grinding park roads and erecting direction and other information signs. Park men also are inspecting and repairing playground equipment, cleaning bathing benches, and soon will be moving out diving rafts and repairing docks.

A number of major developments are under way in many parks, none of which will be ready for public use until later in the summer season.

Seven parks regularly closed during the winter are expected to be ready for regular use in late May. These are Gladwin, White Cloud, Alpena near Cheboygan, Benzie near Frankfort, Charles Mears near Pentwater, D. H. Day at Glen Haven and Bloomer One near Villed Lake Village. Each of the 60 locations again will offer several or more of the following facilities:

... picnicking, fishing, swimming, camping, playgrounds, boating, hiking, riding trails and nature study.

First lifeguards will go on duty on southern park beaches about Memorial Day, sooner if weather and crowds demand.

All services and facilities regularly provided without charge will continue without charge. Tent and trailer campers will pay 50 cents a day. Electricity is available at some parks for a small charge.

Last year Michigan state park and recreation areas drew 11,657, 733 visitors.

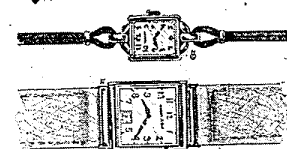

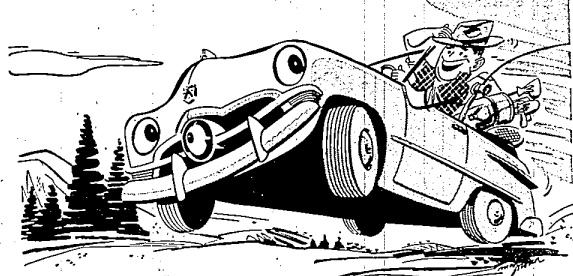

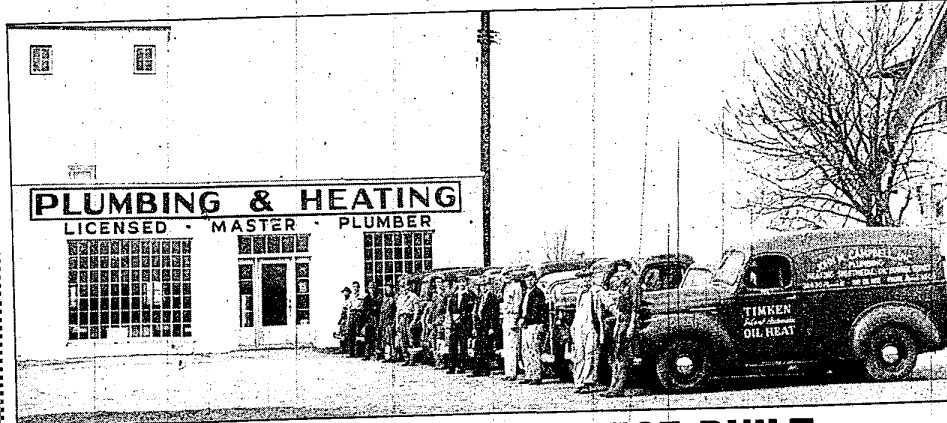
