SUPPER GRILL

Have a Canadian-style bacon grill ready for lunch or dinner in close to 15 minutes time. Place 1/2 inch slices of the bacon and farm pea halves on your broiler rack. U-M Recommends 682 For Teaching Certificates

Another increase in the number of candidates for the teachers certificate has been reported by the School of Education at the University of Michigan.

During the period from July 1, 1950, to July 1, 1951, the school recommended 682 for the certificates, Dr. James B. Edmonson reports. This compares with 534 in the 1949-50 year and 473 in the 1948-49 year.

The figures include graduates from all units of the campus seeking a teachers' certificate. The School of Education acts as the clearing house for all recommendations made by the University to the Michigan Board of Education, the agency which issues the certificates.

Old Masters in Needlepoint Bring New Beauty to Home



Figures Embroidered by Experts, But You Can Work Out Background

ART isn't necessarily something that's to be viewed only on rare visits to museums. It becomes more meaningful if it's something that's lived with, that has a part in the familiar pattern of life.

Few people can afford original paintings by great masters, but that's no reason for shutting yourself off from these classics. Reproductions are the answer.

One well-known firm, recognizing the desire of many people to hang copies of the world's best paintings in their homes, has recently introduced an "old masters" series in needlepoint.

THERE'S appeal in this series not only to the artistic leanings of homemakers, but also to their creative instincts. Although the central figures of such paintings as "Pinkie," "Blue Boy," "Age of Innocence" and "Boy With Rabbit" have already been worked on canvas by skilled Madeira craftswomen, the background is left to be finished by purchasers.

"Old Masters" kits are available in two sizes—full-length and miniature. The larger kits include antique gold or mahogany picture frames. The smaller ones include, in addition to the frames, mats, glass panes, and enough yarn to complete the backgrounds.

The large pictures are planned to be used in pairs; the miniatures, it's suggested, are attractive when hung in groups of four.

COUNTY AGENT GIVES TIPS ON HOME SAFETY

Falls are the number one cause of fatal accidents in Michigan homes, says Mrs. Josephine Lawyer, county home demonstration agent. Falls on stairways are the most frequent cause of accidental deaths in homes, especially among people 65 years and older.

Word from Olevia C. Meyer, extension specialist in home management at Michigan State College, says that the older age groups are most susceptible to falls. In 1949, according to the Michigan State Department of Health, 903 deaths for all ages were caused by falls in Michigan homes. Of these, 781, or 86%, occurred in people 65 years and older.

Seventy-one per cent of those who died as a result of falls on stairs were people over 65 years of age.

Ten simple rules, if strictly followed, can reduce stairway falls, Miss Meyer believes.

1. Provide a good, sturdy hand rail on all stairways, and teach people to use them.

2. Be sure there is good light the length on all stairways without glare in the eyes.

3. Place two-way switches at the top and bottom of the stairway to light your way as you go.

4. Finish steps in light colors to make them easier to see.

5. Keep steps and step coverings in good repair at all times.

6. Remember stairways are not intended for storage.

7. Keep steps clear of small objects such as burned matches, cigarette butts, bobby pins, buttons and marbles.

8. Avoid the use of wax and other

Picnic Foods Must Be Protected, Says State Food Handling Expert

If you can't keep your picnic edibles or pastry, and all meats including fried chicken, cold, you can't keep them hot, then don't keep them long.

For picnics, from inadequately prepared and improperly refrigerated picnic foods make scores of Michigan people seriously ill each summer. Dr. Max Decker, food handling consultant, Division of Engineering, Michigan Department of Health, said in issuing the above warning.

You can make your own picnic foods cold. You can thoroughly chill fried chicken, salads, spreads, cold soups, baked beans, potato salad in your refrigerator. Then pack in sterilized quart or two-quart cans, seal them and set them in a tub of cracked ice, insulated with newspapers.
